The appeals of Ole Skog in County Court against convictions on the Queen Charlotte Islands for breaches of the fishery regulations have been set over until November 30.

The appeal of Andrew Westerland of Hazelton against a three months' sentence to Okalla for supplying liquor to Indians is proceeding in County Court this afternoon before Judge F. McE. Young. John V. Clyne is acting for the appellant and W. E. Fisher for the crown.

Douglas Lay, resident mining engineer for the northeastern mineral survey district with headquarters at Hazelton, arrived in the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train and sailed last night by the Prince George for headquarters in Victoria on departmental duties.

In connection with the settlement of the estate of James Hinchcliffe, who died in 1911 in Leeds, England, information is being sought through local authorities as to the whereabouts of a son, James Baxter Hinchcliffe, who was last heard of in Prince Rupert in September 1914 and in Smithers in May 1915.

The Department of Public Works will make an investigation into the possibility of a route for a wagon road between Prince Rupert and Terrace, where the interior highway system, now under way, is connected up the finding of a feasible route which will not be too expensive from the coast city of Prince Rupert to a point near Terrace, has given a lot of concern to the department in the past.
