Local motorists are disappointed that the Beament cut-off on the new provincial highway will not be in shape for traffic this winter. It has not yet been surfaced and the approaches are still to be completed.

Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Gilbert and Miss K. R. Deacon left Monday to spend a few days in Prince Rupert.

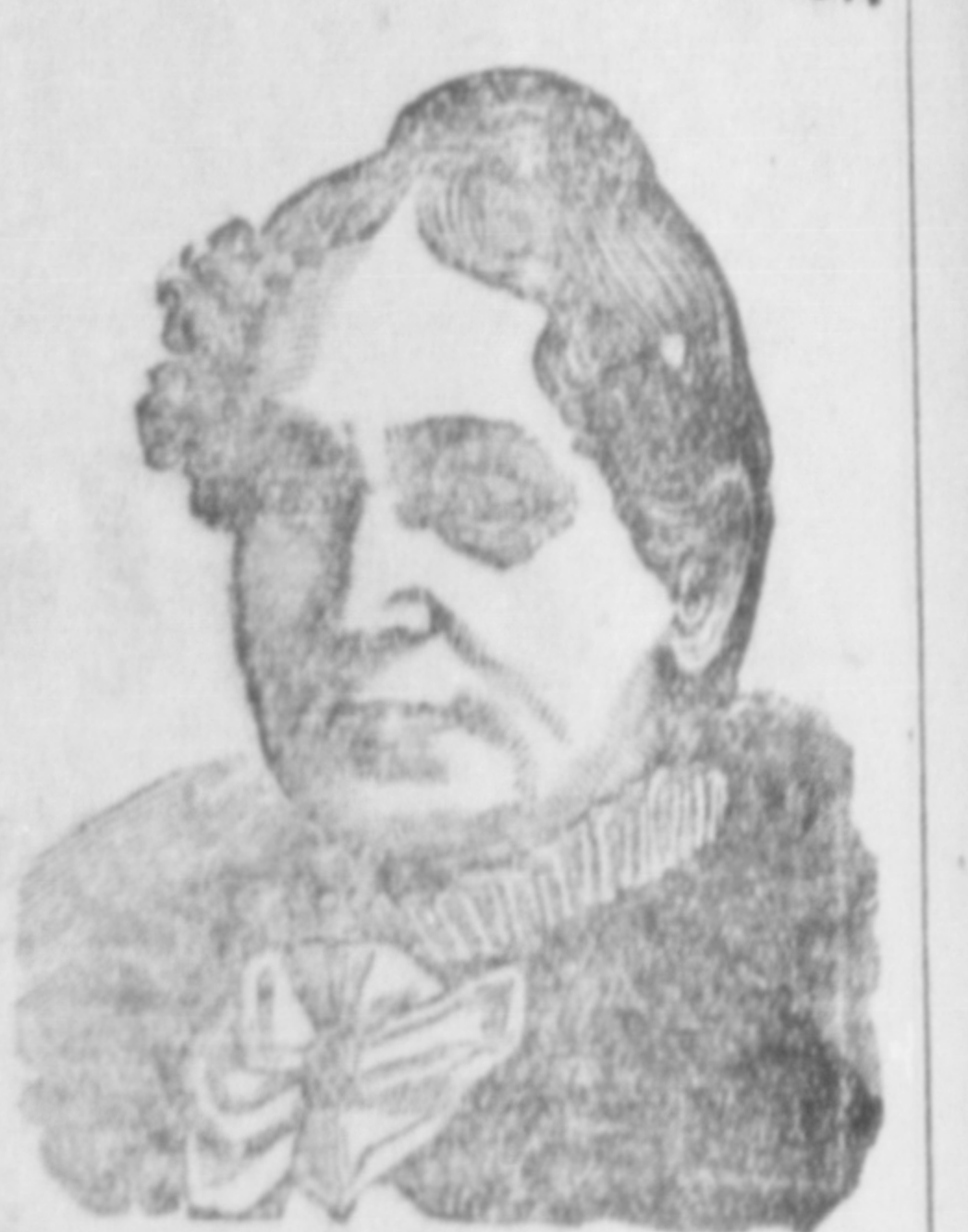
A. C. Small, Swift's representative of Prince Rupert was in town at the beginning of the week.

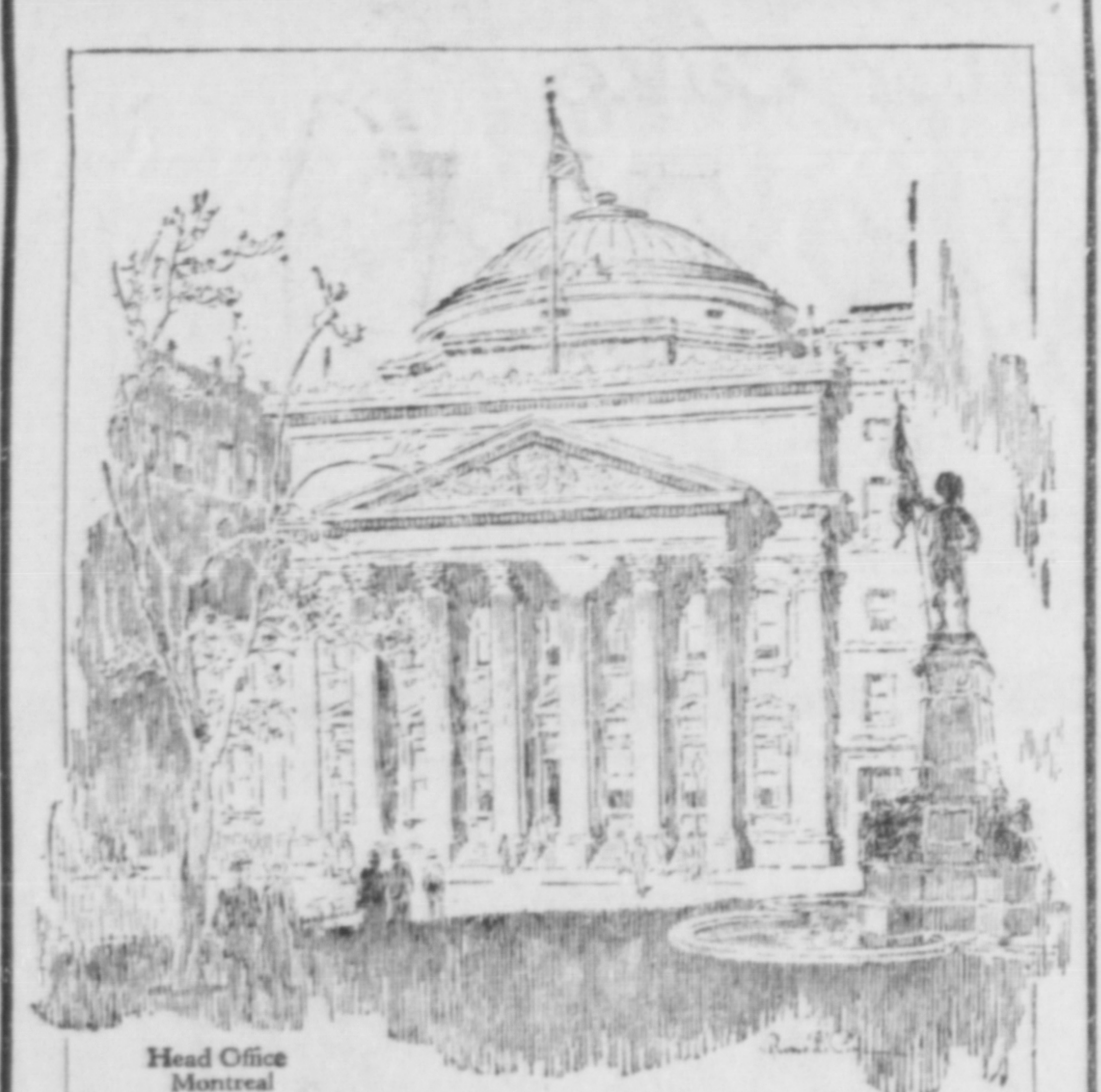
