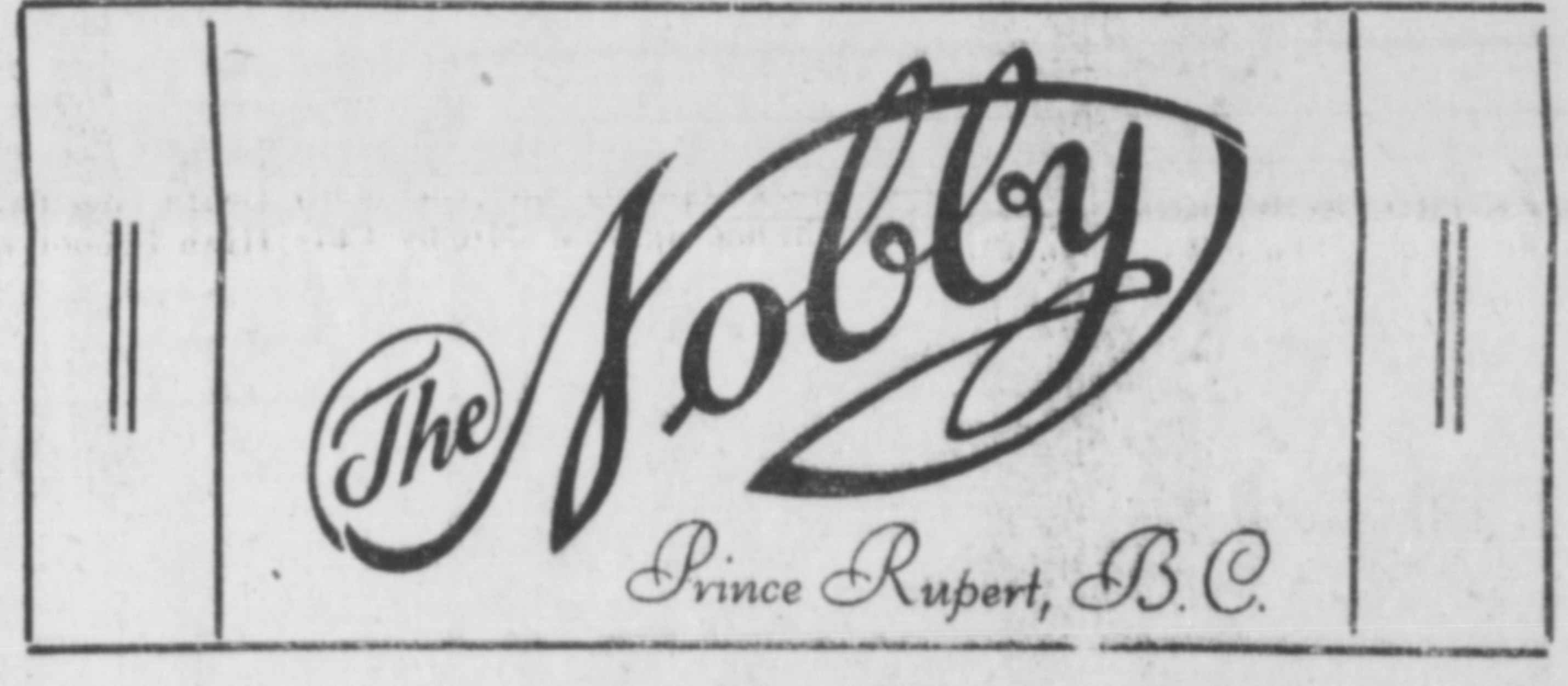

FUNERAL TOOK PLACE TODAY

Rites for Douglas Stewart Held This Afternoon With Rev. J. R. Frizell Officiating

Many sympathizing friends attended at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Stewart, 400 Fourth Avenue West, this afternoon for the sad funeral rites of their elder son, Douglas Gordon, whose death occurred last Monday. The service was held at 2.30 p.m. with Rev. J. R. Frizell, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, officiating. Words of sympathy and comfort were expressed by the minister. The service was of a very quiet character.

The singing of the hymns "Lead Kindly Light" and "Breathe O'er Me, Breath of God" was led by John E. Davey and Mrs. H. C. Fraser acted as accompanist. The High School was represented at the service by Thomas Peddie, principal, and the house captains, Joe Scott, William Collison and Glen Mohr.

After the service, interment took place in Fairview Cemetery, a large concourse of mourners following the cortege to its last resting place. Pall-bearers, members of the father's wholesale house staff, were Alex Finnie, J. G. Johns, Thomas Beattie, G. W. Johnstone, Robert Wood and Louis Arroll.
