Rain in October This Year Nearly Fifty Percent Less Than in 1927

While sunshine, totalling 62.6 hours, was slightly less this October than it was a year ago when 63.1 hours was recorded in the same month, the rainfall, amounting to 9.63 inches, has been much less than a year ago when the October figure was 14.53 inches. The past month has been featured by a good deal of cloudy weather during which there was

Rainfall for this year to date amounts to a total of 66.02 inches as compared with 71.70 inches for the first ten months of 1927. Sunshine this year is up from an aggregate of 1074.5 hours to 1083.8 hours.
