DUNNING SPENDS DAY IN CONSULTATION WITH THONRTON

Engineers Studying Alternative Routes to Coast from Peace River; Parliament to be Asked Sanction

Officials of the Dominion Government Railway ENGLISH CUP Department non-committal regarding reported construction project but admit consideration

OTTAWA, January 13 .- While officials of the railway department are non-committal today in regard to a report that government action is expected in connection with the construction of a railway to furnish a coast outlet to the Peace River country, it is intimated that consideration is being given the matter.

It is understood that engineers entrusted to make an exhaustive survey of the topographical features of the Peace River and advise concerning alternative routes across the mountains have had the matter under study for some time but nothing will be done until the entire situation has received the sanction of Parliament.

Colonel Amery Says it Will be Three or Four Years Before Regular Service


