## MACLEAN SAYS TAXES BEING REDUCED; PAYING FOR P.G.E.

## Premier MacLean Says Taxation Being Reduced and P.G.E. Doing Well

Will Hold an Election Whenever Problem Arises of Sufficient Importance to Warrant Consulting People on it

VICTORIA, February 1.—Making his first important speech in the legislature since assuming the office of Premier, Hon. J. D. Mac-Lean yesterday challenged the opposition claims of increasing taxaion and declared that the taxation total had been reduced half a million dollars every year for the past five years.

Referring to the P.G.E. the Premier said \$33,000,000 in cash had been put into construction. "We have paid every cent of interest on that, paid for maintaining the line in its present condition, paid for the loss on operation and we are now paying \$400,000 every



### Value to British Columbia of · Peace River Block and Railway Belt Promised to be Conveyed

Will Add Half Million Dollars Yearly at Least to Provincial Revenue and immense Area of Land and Timber

VICTORIA, February 1.-Return of the Railway Belt to British Columbia, as forecast in the speech from the throne at Ottawa, will add about \$500,000 immediately to the net receipts of the provincial treasury, place nearly 10,000,000 acres of land under provincial control, and swell provincial assets by the addition of big resources of timber, minerals, agricultural land and water powers. In the Peace River Block, which the province expects to secure in addition to the railway belt, British Columbia will gain 3,500,000 acres, much of it fertile agricultural land suitable for heavy production.
