JAPANESE AND CHINESE CLASH

RELATIONS STRAINED FOLLOWING CANCELLATION OF TREATY-NATIONALISTS AND INSUR-GENTO FIGHT

TOKIO, July 24.—Japan has refused to accept the Nationalist Chinese government's cancellation of the Chinese-Japanese commercial treaty and notified Nanking that it considers China took an illegal step in the cancellation. Relations are further strained between the two countries.

CAR PLUNGES THROUGH FERRYBOAT INTO WATERS OF LAKE WASH-INGTON LAST NIGHT

SEATTLE, July 24.—Five Japanese-T. Suda, his wife, two children and a neighbor lad-were drowned last night when the Suda car plunged from a ferryboat at Leschi Park into Lake Washington.
