The Senate Not in Line With Progress.

The Senate of Canada is out of touch with the people. It is an irresponsible body and has no sense of obligation to act in unison with popular opinion. It is not even elected, but appointments to it are usually political in their nature. Unfortunately it seems to be a difficult matter to disturb the serence of this wonderful institution because it is necessary to get its own consent to any reforms or to abolishing it. Possibly this might be obtained if it was understood that the tenure of the present occupants was to be left undsiturbed, all new appointments to be on a different basis.

One of these was an amendment to the criminal law of Canada and the other was the Liquor Act, both very important measures. Whether we agree with the wisdom of these measures or not, we must agree that the people have a right to say what laws shall be made, but with parliament as a present constituted the people have very little say.
