The Stampede group on the Klehin River, near the boundary between British Columbia and the Yukon Territory, may furnish a new gold quartz mine. A vein has been developed by stripping for a length of 3,000 feet, carrying over half its length free gold over a width of from five to seven feet. While the values are low, ranging from \$7 to \$8, they are sufficient to make a paying operation provided they are maintained. The only doubt is, being from oxidized surface, whether they represent a local enrichment of higher value than the average Monday, October 1, 1928 value of the sulphides which will probably be found with deep development to constitute the valuable part of the vein.
