HONOR SHOWN TO BRITISH STATESMAN BY NAVY OF U.S.

British Labor Comes Out Flat For Socialism But Opposes The Communistic Policy Of Russia

Lansbury Tells Why There Could Not be Political Relationship With Liberals in That Country in Speech at Big Conference

BIRMINGHAM, October 1. - Labor candidates at the next general election will bear aloft the banner of Socialism, declared George Lansbury, who made the keynote speech at the opening of the annual conference of the Labor party today.

More than a thousand delegates to the Labor political gathering heard the party's member for Bow and Bromley urge that Great Britain's resources be owned and used in the service of all the people.

Coupled with Lansbury's statement regarding Socialism was a bitter attack on British Communists and Bolshevik methods, which, he said, were entirely opposed by British Labor and would not be applied in Great Britain.

Because other British political parties were opposed to Socialism in their policies, Lansbury said, political relationship with them was impossible.

The chairman attacked the Baldwin government's international policy, particularly with regard to India and China and Soviet Russia, and said the Labor party would re-establish diplomatic relations if successful in the 1929 elections.


