**AROUND PRINCE RUPERT**  
Excellent Results on Babine-Silver King—Kitsault  
Eagle Active at Alice Arm—Much Ore at  
Topley-Silver

Excellent results have been secured from the season's development on the Babine-Silver King property, a gold-silver-lead proposition in the Babine, 18 miles northeast of Smithers. In the main tunnel, a cross-cut shows 21 feet of ore which gave an assay averaging \$61 over the entire width. Surface trenching and stripping on another vein have extended the opening of this lead for 1,000 feet in length and with good ore in all the cuts. This vein averages four feet in width and runs in the direction of the Cronin property. On the Victoria group, in the same locality, P. J. Higgins and crew have opened up the main vein for some three thousand feet on the surface and in the main tunnel has been uncovered ore giving assay values of \$9 in gold, 376 ounces per ton silver and 17 per cent lead.

The Alexandria Gold Mines Ltd. plans even more extensive development of the Babine Bonanza property than did the late James Cronin. Thomas Davey, M.E., has been retained to design and supervise the new mill and it is hoped to have the property an active producer early next spring. Some 50,000 tons of ore has been proven, averaging about \$30 to the ton. It is now well known that Grant Mahood, who secured the property recently, was just a couple of jumps ahead of other big interests who would have taken it.

New ore has been opened up during the past summer by the Kitsault-Eagle Silver Mines Ltd. on the Silver Cord, Eagle and Leroy groups of mineral claims at Alice Arm. On the Silver Cord two shifts have been employed underground and a small crew on surface stripping and trenching, a large tonnage of ore being developed. Zinc-lead ore from this property captured first prize at the recent Vancouver Exhibition. On the Eagle, near the LaRose mine, a cross-cut tunnel was driven and at a distance of 228 feet tapped the ten-foot vein at a depth of 150 feet, opening up good ore values in silver and gold. Work on the Leroy group has been confined to surface stripping and trenching. On the Sunrise the main ore shoot from 4 to 15 feet wide has been opened on the surface for 2,000 feet by a series of open cuts and trenches and work has now started on an 1,000-foot cross-cut tunnel to tap this ore body at vertical depth of 500 feet. New camps have been erected providing for the accommodation of 15 men at both the Silver Cord and Sunrise groups and mining will be carried out throughout the winter.

Development work has been carried out steadily during the past summer by the Topley-Silver Ltd. on the Golden-Eagle group of mineral claims — sometimes called the Shelly group — situated near the Topley-Richfield. Two shafts now sunk have revealed some veins of exceptionally high grade ore as well as a large body of low-grade. Mine and camp equipment is now complete. Many open cuts have been made at different points along the vein for a distance of about 700 feet, one shaft having been sunk to a depth of eighty feet and a second,
