Waterfront Whiffs

To Dismantle and Abandon Pezuta; Car Barge Gaily Launched

The Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co. will dismantle the log carrying barge Pezuta which recently went ashore near Tiell in Skidegate Inlet, and the hull will be abandoned as a total loss. Announcement to this effect is made by Capt. W. P. Armour, manager of the Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co., who returned to the city a few days ago after making an inspection of the wreck. The expense that would be involved in re-floating the bulky barge would more than exceed her value. Machinery that can be salvaged, however, includes such as donkey boilers, winches and hoisting engines. While at the wreck Captain Armour superintended the taking off of three truck loads of machinery which was taken to Port Clements. Further salvage operations, which will be in charge of Capt. R. Gangnon, will be instituted within the next few days, as soon as the big power tug Salvage Princess comes off the dry dock, where she has been undergoing annual overhaul during the past fortnight. The material salvaged will be brought here by scow to be sold.

"The finest launching of the season," declared Capt. J. R. Elford, harbor master, when the C. N. R. car barge slipped into the water from the big shipshed at the dry dock on Thursday afternoon, and all present agreed. Actually, everything went off without a ripple and it was a pretty sight as the big flag bedecked and substantial looking craft took to the element while Miss Evelyn Macdonald, popular winsome young stenographer at the yard, broke the proverbial bottle of champagne against the steel hull.

After the launch, Glen McMillan, Walter Humé, Bill Morgan, Charlie Culien and other officials of the yard proved themselves excellent hosts to various guests in the general offices of the dry dock and, after the future well being of the new craft had been duly toasted, the staff rightly called it a good day's work and went home hoping that such jobs would come more frequently.

Engine overhaul for the halibut boats Oslo, Inez H. and Alken has been completed by the Star Welding and the next boats to receive such treatment there will be the Rose Spit, Balsac and Minnie V.

Bert Wearmouth Away

After having kept his nose pretty close to the grindstone since coming home from the war, Bert Wearmouth left yesterday for Vancouver on his first holiday trip in about nine years, taking with him the best wishes of his many friends for real good time. During his absence Bert has placed chums this year and are all well cradled at the old Crippen boneless herring factory on Digby Island.

Jack Morrison is receiving congratulations on his re-election for although the catch was small. The third term as local agent of Naas, however, was poorer than the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, ever as regards sockeye. Rivers

Inlet was well supplied and the spawning beds at Smith's Inlet are also well seeded, although there was a big pack there. Improved conditions in this regard are taken as an indication that the department's close watch on fishery conditions during the past season and the extra close seasons have had good results.

Sherman High Boat

The halibut schooner Sherman of Petersburg, which is owned and captained by Andrew Johnson and which is well known in Prince Rupert, is believed to have been the high share boat of the entire Pacific halibut fleet during the past season. The Sherman's shares are reported to have run slightly over \$3000 per man, which is the highest mark yet reported. The Sherman landed 15 of her catches this season at Prince Rupert, 219,000 being the aggregate poundage for these.

Capt. Anton Strand of Petersburg has sold the well known American halibut boat Unimak to Capt. Ole Husvig and has left for a trip to Norway, where he expects to spend about a year visiting with relatives. On his return he expects to get back in the halibut game again.

The safe shelter of the local dry dock is jammed with boats tied up for the winter at the floats. There are a particularly large number of halibut vessels moored there.

Jimmy Farquhar, popular quill pusher for Edward Lipsett (Prince Rupert) Ltd., has been spending a holiday this week rustinating at Terrace, far out of danger's way.

Progress is being made by the Prince Rupert Fisheries experimental station with experimental studies on dog fish oil, which tend to show that this oil may be particularly valuable for food and medicinal purposes. The work, which is attracting the interest of the reduction industry, shows that dog fish oil can be hydrogenated to produce a solid, white and odorless fat which might be used for the manufacture of edible fats such as margarine. The content of vitamin A, without which growth in animals cannot take place, is greater in dog fish than in cod liver oil. Research as to vitamin D content is now being continued by H. N. Brodlesby.
