Important Visitors Coming to City.

The most influential members of the Boards of Trade of Victoria and Vancouver are expected to arrive in Prince Rupert seventy strong on Saturday, July 26. They are people who have it in their power to do a great deal for this city. They represent the big financial and business interests.

Prince Rupert people are intending to entertain them in a proper manner so that they may go away with a good impression of the place. They are preparing to show them everything including the harbor, the drydock and shipbuilding plant, the cold storage plant and the big mill and cannery. Also it is proposed to give them a dinner in the evening.

Naturally the question of financing this has to be considered. The local Board of Trade has but limited means at its disposal. It is arranging for some civic advertising which will absorb all its spare funds. Just how it is to be done has been left for a committee to suggest, but it is thought that as the city as a whole stands to benefit from the visit, the city should pay the greater part of the expense.

The Interior Also Being Investigated.

The local Board of Trade is also arranging the itinerary of the visitors through the interior. They will go in a special train and will stop at suitable points and be driven by the Boards of Trade and others interested, through the richest and best portions of the Bulkley and other valleys. Their visit will be beneficial in securing the settling up of those interior lands and in establishing trade relations with the districts. In that way their visit interests Prince Rupert very largely.

Local Scenery Not Appreciated.

"This is the most beautiful place I have ever visited," said a lady visitor here recently. She meant what she said and especially she referred to the superb view to be obtained from the westerly part of the city usually known as section two. She expatiated further on the scenic value of the place and explained that the air here was so soft and cool and fresh, such a delightful change from the hot glare of the tropics.

Few of us realize that right here in Prince Rupert we have a climate that is far above the average. We do not appreciate our privileges. We are apt to scoff at anything which smacks of optimism in connection with our natural endowments. Yet here we find visitors who testify to the beauty of our scenery, the enjoyable climate, and the pleasure they take in spending a holiday here.

Commercialize Our Local Sport.

Can we commercialize our local sport? At the Board of Trade meeting yesterday Mr. Cotes referred to the value of the fishing and hunting to Prince Rupert as a commercial commodity. We have trout that are the equal of any in the world. Away over in the state of Maine the fish and game have been commercialized to such an extent that it has become a great asset. Men come from all over the country to hunt and fish in Maine. Why should they not come to hunt and fish in and around Prince Rupert? The thing is not only possible but highly desirable. The more visitors we get, the better for the city. All visitors leave money behind them. We shall in the future look more and more for this source of revenue.
