LONDON SUFFERS FROM SEVERE WIND AND RAIN STORM

Premier Tolmie Comes Out In Favor Canadian Naval Power Extension

Says Ports on Pacific Should Be Protected and Canada Should Assume Proper Share of Work.

VICTORIA, Oct. 23.—The time has come when Canada should assume its proper share of the work of protecting the British Empire by sea, Premier Tolmie said here, speaking at the Trafalgar Day ceremonies at the Parliament Buildings.

"Being enthusiastic Britishers when we have a bushel of wheat to sell or when we need some capital, is not playing our part in the Empire," the Premier said. "We in Canada have on the Pacific Coast in our own province an extensive coast line. We have on that coast rapidly dereloping cities, big industries, accumulation of much wealth. Our coast cities are the outlet for the great indterland to the north and east of us. These ports and his coast line must be defended, not only for ourselves but for all of Canada because of their place in Canada's foreign trade."

Lord Cushendun, acting as foreign minister, explained that the only reason for withholding publication of the papers was fear of embarrassing other governments by what might seem an attempt to force their hand.
