SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 16 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditions of residence, occupation and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$19 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free or party free permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers up to ten head.

NEW THEATRE OPENED WITH BIG AUDIENCE

Speeches Precede Regular Program at First Performance at Capitol

Prince Rupert's splendid new entertainment centre, the Capitol Theatre, built at a cost of some \$100,000 by Misak and Paul Avazoff with whom the Famous Players Canadian Corporation will be associated in the operation was thrown open to the public last night with all due formality, large audiences being in attendance at both initial performances. In the building itself this city may boast a handsome addition to its architecture. The amusement facilities it promises to offer are also a distinct acquisition. There was probably not a person in the two large crowds of some 700 patrons on each occasion last night who was not highly pleased with the appearance of the house, inside and out, and who did not enjoy to the full the excellent program of pictures, vaudeville and music which was offered.

After the orchestra, under the conductorship of Jack de Jausserand, violinist and leader, had played an overture, the opening ceremonies took place promptly at 7 p.m., the full capacity of the house having been taken up well in advance of the hour set. Speeches appropriate to the occasion were given by J. C. Brady, M.P.; Ald. P. H. Linzey, Col. J. W. Nicholls, president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, and Frank Gow, superintendent of the Famous Players Canadian Corporation for British Columbia. A. A. Eason, manager of the theatre acted as master of ceremonies, introduced the speakers and read congratulatory telegrams which had been received by the management.

Mr. Johnston told the committee that he had secured much data in regard to local matters and was aware of certain improvements that could be made. He stated that he would have a full report to present to the railway company on the action.

DINNER DANCE AFTER OPENING


Mr. and Mrs. Misak Avazoff and Paul Avazoff Entertained Friends Last Night
