NEW YORK, June 29.—Both New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals increased their margins of leadership in the Big Leagues yesterday. The Yanks are now twelve-and-a-half games ahead of the Philadelphia Athletics in the American League while the Cards are five-and-a-half games ahead of the New York Giants in the National League.

St. Louis Browns renewed their threat on second place in the American by winning over Detroit Tigers while the Athletics fell victim again to the Yankees.
