**ALL-CANADA BADMINTON GAMES SOON**

Championship Matches Scheduled For Toronto Early in March to Draw Many Players

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—When the Canadian Badminton Championships, scheduled for March 1, 2, 3, get under way here, leading Canadian players from coast to coast will take part.

Badminton is a strenuous game. Exceptional energy and stamina, keen eyes and an excellent sense of timing are essential in a good badminton player. The game itself was named after Badminton, the Duke of Beaufort's seat in Gloucestershire, England. The English tried it first, so far as is known, in the army garrisons of India, where it is still highly popular. It was introduced into England about 1873, and in 1885 the first Badminton Association was formed there. Four years later the All-England championships and mixed doubles were inaugurated, and one year later men's and ladies' singles were scheduled. The game made its appearance in Canada about 1910 and was soon a favorite pastime of the permanent officers at Toronto, Halifax, Kingston and other military centres. It has made big strides in Canada during the last 10 years.

TAKE NOTICE that an application will be made to the Parliament of Canada at the next session thereof for an Act:

For the incorporation of a company to be known as The Alberta, Peace River and Pacific Railway Company, or such other name as may be given, to construct and operate a railway as follows:—

(a) Commencing at a point at or near the City of Lethbridge, thence in a Westerly direction to a point at or near the Town of McLeod, thence Westerly and Northerly in a direction generally parallel to the Calgary and McLeod Branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway to a point at or near the City of Calgary, thence Northerly and West of the Calgary and Edmonton railway to a point at or near Lacombe, thence Northerly to a point at or near the City of Edmonton.

(b) From a point at or near the City of Edmonton by the most feasible route to and along the right bank of the Simonette River to a crossing of the Smoky River near its junction with the Wapiti River at or near Beatonson to the Town of Grande Prairie in the Province of Alberta, thence South Westerly through the Mountain Pass to a point at or near Aleza Lake on the Canadian National Railway to the Province of British Columbia.

(c) From a point at or near Grande Prairie in a North Westerly direction to a point at or near Pouce Coupe in a North Westerly direction to a point at or near Hudson's Hope on the Peace River, thence in a general South Westerly and Westerly direction and North Westerly through the most feasible route through the Pine Pass to a point at or near the Town of Stewart in the Province of British Columbia at the head of Fortland Canal.

(d) From a point at or near Hudson's Hope crossing Peace River in a general Easterly direction to a point at or near White Lake, thence in a Northerly direction to a point at or near Fort Vermilion and thence Northerly and Westerly to the right bank of the Hay River at or near its intersection with the Northern boundary of the Province of Alberta.

The said railways being declared to be for the general benefit of Canada.

2. To authorize the said Company to construct wharves, docks and hotels and to own and operate vessels and to collect charges on telegraph and telephone messages of the public, to file upon and generate water power sites and to generate electric and other energy and to dispose of the surplus from and collect charges therefor.

3. To authorize the said Company to issue securities in respect of the said line of railway to an amount not exceeding Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars per mile for the prairie sections, and not exceeding Sixty-five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars for the mountain section.

**CHAMPIONSHIP WON BY RUPERT**

Locals Capture Northern B.C. Title From Port Simpson Though Beaten Saturday Night

Prince Rupert has won the Northern British Columbia Senior basketball championship from Port Simpson Athletic Club. Port Simpson defeated Prince Rupert in the second and last game of the title series at Port Simpson Saturday evening by a score of 31-27, the four point lead of the natives not being sufficient, however, to win the series for them, the local having defeated them in the first game here Friday night by 44 to 31, the Rupert lead being thus reduced to nine points on the two matches.

Rough play, particularly on the part of Port Simpson, is reported to have featured the Saturday night game. At that, Prince Rupert was ahead 27 to 25 within three minutes of the end of the match, Port Simpson finishing with a scoring rally which gave them six points. Half time score was 14-12 in Prince Rupert's favor. George Mitchell of Prince Rupert was the only player put off the floor during the game which was refereed by Paul Price of Port Simpson, assisted by Harry Menzie of Prince Rupert on the side lines.

**APPROVES GOVERNMENT MEASURES TO INSPECT IMMIGRANTS ABROAD**

TORONTO, Feb. 26.—Approval of the Federal Government's action in providing for the medical inspection abroad of prospective immigrants to Canada was expressed by resolution at the meeting of the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene in the Medical Building of the University of Toronto. The resolution was moved by Dr. A. H. Desloges of Quebec. He thought the Government's policy would save immigrants the unnecessary hardship of being turned back on reaching Canada and would also assure the Dominion of a higher type of new-comer.

Another suggestion of Dr. Desloges was that the law should be changed governing the deportation of immigrants. At present, he said, no one could be deported after five years' residence in the country. This rule did not apply in other countries, which could deport Canadians up to a much longer period.
