



VICTORIA, Sept. 22.—Suggestions that a great step towards the solution, of the P.G.E. promlem will be the turning of the whole railway country into a great sheep raising area with millions of sheep grazing upon 't are expected to receive serious consideration from Premier Tolmie and kis cabinet, in view of recent remarks on the subject by the Premier.

Dr. Tolmie has in several of his talks strongly advocated development of the sheep industry in B. C. and the utilization of the great grazing areas in the province not now being used.

A proposal from Vancouer is that the B. C. Government campaign energetically for colonists to engage in sheep ranching along the P.G.E. It would pay the Government, it is claimed, to conduct experimental . ranches there and to make available at low cost pedigreed Rambouillet and Marino sheep, so adaptable to to that climate.

Sheep raising is described as the most profitable branch of agriculture in Western Canada today and one that is advancing most rapidly. The domestic market for mutton is still far greater than the domestic supply.

Victoria Boy Victim of Rifle Shot at Hands of Companion

VICTORIA, Sept. 22 .- The first hunting fatality occurred yesterday when Douglas Munday, 23 years of age, was accidentally killed by a bullet from the rifle his chum Laurance Woodward was carryig while hunting in the Sooke district. Munday was shot Gibson, 5,000 pounds, Canadian through the neck and died almost instantly.

Just how it happened Woodward was unable to state because of his condition resulting from
