Prince Rupert or Prince George for Anyox and Stewart each Friday, 4:00 p.m. Sailings for Skagway and intermediate Alaska ports each Wednesday 4:00 p.m. SS. Prince John will operate Prince Rupert-Vancouver via south Queen Charlotte Islands, leaving Prince Rupert fortnightly commencing Monday, June 17th.
