

Local Inspector Makes Report on Trouble Finding Suggestions For Better Reception

A general meeting of the Prince Rupert Radio Association was held last night in the City Hall. erable enthusiasm was displayed. D. C. McRae, president, was in the chair with C. G. Ham, secretary.

One of the features of the proceedings was a report by Felix Batt upon his activities since having been appointed a few months ago as part time radio inspector here. He mentioned a number of factors which caused trouble with reception. Along this line, he declared, considerable improvement had been made but there was still much to be learned and done in the matter of eliminating noises. Radio owners should report to him any definite information as to the cause of interference and this would assist greatly in getting relief.

A committee consisting of Ben Rice, William Sandison and Fred Riffou was appointed to investigate and secure the names of all radio owners in the city, particularly those having amateur broadcasting code sets or regenerative sets. A report will be made by this committee at next meeting.

There was a general discussion on the matter of improving reception, particular reference being made to aerials and grounding. It was suggested by W. R. Love that it might be a good idea to try grounding by some other means PAGE RIDEOUT than by using water pipes which is a general practice here. By that means, Mr. Love believed much of the noise might be eliminated.

Sees Rupert as Possible Port for Peace Country

The Peace River block is as yet unserved by railway transportation, says Floyd S. Chalmers in the Financial Post. There has been considerable discussion of inking Peace River with the Pacfic Coast either by way of a railway to Prince Rupert or by an extension of the Pacific Great Fastern Railway northward. Such a Pacific coast outlet for Peace River is a possibility and indeed a probability within the next decade. But it is recognized that it would be a very expensive proposition to build costing possibly as much as one hundred million dolars in all. Also it is recognized more immediate need of this district is a link with the railway that runs north from Edmonton. So the railway is certain to be deferred for a few years
