Mgr. J. J. Little Makes Announcement of Work Proceeding at Stewart; Has Been Buying

He came through from Montreal and will first undertake the preliminary work of erection of offices and then will proceed at once with actual construction.

MONUMENT IS UNVEILED BY PATRICK BURNS

Famous Missionary Honored by Many Yesterday at St. Albert Alberta

ST. ALBERT, Alta., July 22:—In honor of the man whom the Indians called "The Noble Soul" and "The Man With the Good Heart," and who has come to be known in history as one of the greatest pioneers in Western Canada, 3000 men and women gathered today at the little town of St. Albert, nine miles out of Edmonton, on the Canadian National Railway.

"For 67 years he labored for God, his fellow men and his country," says the inscription on the base of the monument to Father Lacombe which was unveiled yesterday afternoon, and citizens prominent in the affairs of the Northwest and of Canada itself, paid tribute to him as a man, a teacher and a builder.

Born in Quebec in 1827, Father Lacombe came west in 1849 and built his mission at St. Albert nearly 60 years ago. Today, high on the hill and within a step of the old log church which afterwards became the cathedral, stands the life size figure in bronze of the great missionary. With cross uplifted as in the days of his heroism among the Indians, Father Lacombe stands and looks down over the valley. The statue was brought from France by means of the efforts of Rev. Father Jan, O.M.I., parish priest of St. Albert, assisted by prominent citizens and old timers of Alberta, and by a group of patrons, of which one of the most interested was Sir Henry Thornton.

The statue was unveiled by Patrick Burns of Calgary, old friend of Father Lacombe, and addresses were delivered by Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, Liguory Lacombe, M.P., relative of the honored missionary, and representative of Quebec, His Honor Dr. William Egbert, Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, Mayor A. U. G. Bury, of Edmonton, His Grace Archbishop O'Leary, Rev. Dr. D. G. McQueen, old timer and chaplain of the old timers association of Northern Alberta, Dr. J. L. Pettitclere, president of the French-Canadian Association of party, consisting of 10 medical Albertans, and James E. Reilly, secretary of the Father Lacombe Memorial.
