FISHING GOOD ON THE SKEENA

Well Known Lad High Boat for Week Fishing Alone and Making Tidy Sum for Himself

Salmon fishing on the Skeena River has been very good to date, but this is looked upon by cannermen as the big week of the season and much depends on it. So far the sockeye run has been as good as in the banner year of 1924. While the catch on Friday was not quite as good as on some previous days, there is no indication that the run will not continue.

On the river last week, while the average boat was about fifty, some did a good deal better than that. Jimmy Donaldson of Port Essington was high man at Haysport cannery with over six hundred, which at the prevailing price of 65 each for those using their own gear, were worth over \$400, and Jimmy was fishing alone.

Alberta Needs Only Two Thousand Men to Help in Harvest Work

EDMONTON, July 22:—Harvesters' excursions from the east and other outside points into Alberta will be away down this year, as compared with previous years, and it is now believed that not more than 2000 men, in addition to those now in the province, will be needed to gather the coming crop. It is estimated that about 45 per cent of the entire man power at work on the 1928 harvesting operations will take care of this year's requirements.
