Proposal to Break Down Frontier Between United States and Great Britain Same as With Canada

Canada Likely to Be Present at Meeting Between Ramsay
Macdonald and President Hoover at
Washington in Near Future

LONDON, June 10.—The Daily Herald, organ of the Labor party, today says Prime Minister Macdonald desires a personal consultation with President Hoover on Anglo-American relations and is willing to go to the United States for that purpose. If the meeting is arranged, the paper says, the British cabinet is likely to take the view it is essential for Canada to be represented and Premier Mackenzie King would probably be invited to represent the Dominion in the conversations.

The Herald's announcement came close on the heels of the prediction of the Observer Saturday that this meeting, with the Canadian minister included, will be arranged. The Observer said it might settle once and for all the relations between the British Empire and the United States and extend the unfortified frontier between Canada and United States to the Atlantic Ocean, dividing the British Isles and America.

LONDON, June 10.—The Evening Standard, says the Cabinet Council today, gave particular attention to the Anglo-American relations and that Premier Macdonald's expressed wish to get in personal touch with President Hoover was communicated to the cabinet.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Premier Mackenzie King will notify the House today or tomorrow as to whether or not he has received an invitation to attend a possible conference between Premier Ramsay Macdonald and President Hoover respecting the disarmament problems.

In answer to queries from E. J. Garland, U.E.A., of Bow River, Hon. J. A. Robb told the House today that the premier would in all probability make a statement with reference to the rumored conference shortly. The premier was not in the House.

Hope of a disarmament conference between the British premier and the United States president was revealed by London newspapers, Mr. Garland said, referring to articles in the Daily Herald and Observer, which also suggested the possibility of Premier King being asked to attend.

Norman A. Watt, who will turn over his duties as government agent here to Charles L. 

VICTORIA, June 10.—Forest fire danger is disappearing with cool and wet weather over the whole of the province, the week-end report of the forest branch of the department of lands states. The fire hazard is reported as a slight one in any part of British Columbia.

PRAIRIE CROPS LOOKING GOOD

WINNIPEG, June 10.—The situation with regard to all grains in western Canada continues to remain quite satisfactory, according to the sixth weekly crop report of the Canadian National Railways, issued today. Not from any point is there a report of parasitic or other conditions which could be viewed with anxiety. On the contrary, the growth of wheat and the coarser grains has been steady and encouraging. Early sown wheat is from five to eight inches above ground and later sown wheat from four to six inches up. In only one district, that about Chamberlain, Sask., are cutworms reported, and the damage from them there has been very slight.

At the moment there is a sufficient supply of moisture in the ground to do for present needs. At the same time, a good down-pour would be welcome everywhere. Rain is more anxiously awaited in northern Alberta, the southern part of the same province east of Calgary and in the southern portion of the central and western sections of Saskatchewan. In all these areas high dry winds have been experienced during the past week, drying out the subsoil and causing some drifting. Here and there, especially between Argo and Hemaruka, Sask., and in the vicinity of Gravelbourg, and the light soil districts south of Moose Jaw, the blowing out of some crops has occurred. This condition is not general, however, and cannot be considered as serious.

The prevalence of wild oats and other weeds is causing annoyance to farmers west of Brandon, through Kipling to Regina. Nowhere else are weeds reported. Seeding of all grains may now be regarded as completed and summer fallowing is under way in most districts. This work will be pursued more actively following the first heavy rain.

VICTORY ON ANNUITIES IN IRELAND

By-election in Sligo Fought
On Question of National
Honor

DUBLIN, June 10.—A government victory was scored in the by-election in Sligo and Leitrim when General Sean McKoin was returned over Eamon Donnelly.

The Republican Government regarded the election as a test of confidence, it being a question of the payment or non-payment of land purchase annuities to the British Government and campaigned on the stand that failure to do so would be a breach of faith. Republicans maintained that the annuities should be paid into the Irish treasury instead of the British.

MURDER AND SUICIDE ON FARM TODAY

WINNIPEG, June 10.—Mrs. Ruth Jones and her 11-year-old son were shot and killed today by Kost Werseuk on a farm near Dropmore, in the central part of southern Manitoba. Immediately afterwards, it is said, Werseuk killed himself.

According to the reports of Abraham Jones, proprietor of the farm, had ordered the hired man to work shortly after breakfast. Seizing a gun, it is stated, Werseuk fired several times at Jones, who hastened away to call the police. On Jones' return he found that the wife and son had been slain and the workman had committed suicide.

VATICAN CITY, June 10.—The Pope today promulgated the "Fundamental law" of the new Vatican state in 21 articles.

The first gives the Pontiff full legislative and judiciary powers.

In case the Papacy becomes vacant the power goes to the college of cardinals which can only take legislative measures in case of extreme urgency.

PRINCE DAVID DUE AT RUPERT TONIGHT

New Steamer for Local Service of
C. N. Steamships Expected
From Halifax

The steamer Prince David, formerly the Greek Aksion, which has been purchased by the Canadian National Coast Steamships for local service out of Prince Rupert, is expected to reach Prince Rupert tonight. The vessel so far is not equipped with wireless, so no definite word has been received from her. She was to have left Union Bay, where she coaled, on Saturday night for Prince Rupert. In command of the vessel on the long voyage from Halifax has been Captain Edgecumbe and William Thomas is chief officer.

The Prince David will undergo extensive alterations at the local dry dock before being placed in service.
