


FOUGHT AT CHICA GO NEW COLISEUM

BIG ENTRY IN KING'S PLATE

Large Number of Entries For Big Toronto Race This Year

TORONTO, April 4:—It is early yet to consider closely the merits of the candidates for the King's Plate, outstanding event of the Canadian turf, but the season will open at old Woodbine Park here on May 18 and perhaps a record field will start in the classic, which features the opening day program. At any rate 58 Canadian-breds are named in the entries for the 1929 renewal of the oldest continuously-run stake event on the American continent.

The race will be over the mile and a quarter course, for the 50 guineas offered by the King and \$15,000 added by the Ontario Jockey Club. Jimmy Loftus in the Mail and Empire says: "At this time a King's Plate story can hardly be more than a memorandum of the two-year-old form of the entrants, and this form is generally inadequate. The juvenile records do not show a candidate's worth over a mile, and as the plate distance is 10 furlongs, only breeding can be used as authority for staying power. Again, the two-year-old ugly duckling often comes out the swan in his three-year-old year. Older entries, must carry crushing imposts in the scale of weights, and most handicappers therefore consider their chances mighty slim."

Pin Wheel Favorite Gossip among Canadian turf enthusiasts appear to centre the favoritism on the Thorncliffe and Seagram stable entries, with the bulk of the support going to Pin Wheel, winner of the closing juvenile home-bred stakes, and Circulet, the speedy Seagramite who was undefeated until he broke down in the Clarendon Plate. Outsiders, however, are given greater consideration this year than in 1928 when Young Kitty overshadowed her field, and the race is expected to be an "open" one.

Circulet, Irish Sphere and Dance Circle are the trio entered by the Seagrams and on their juvenile form up to midseason the first two named appear to have a regal chance to repeat the success of the Waterloo establishment.

Fred Schelke, placid conditioner of the Thorncliffe Stable string, will undoubtedly pin his hopes on Pin Wheel, the chestnut son of First Sight-Skyrocket, bred by Mrs. Livingston at her Cobourg farm. Then there is also Shorelint, a winner at Woodbine in the fall, and Fair Oil,

DIRECTION FINDING BY RADIO TODAY

Two Methods Used, One by Fully Equipped Stations and Other by Beacons

It is presumed that the two radio direction finding stations which J. C. Brady, M.P., has announced are to be placed on Langara and Green Islands by the federal government as aids to navigation for shipping entering this port would be each manned with a staff of four operators, such as that at Pachena on the west coast of Vancouver Island. On approaching the coast from sea a ship asks such a station as Pachena for its bearings, the finding and transmission to the ship of which is the work of the operators by technical means. Mr. Brady stated that both Langara and Green Island direction finding stations would have a radius of 200 miles. It would also be possible for such stations to do commercial radiotelegraphy.

The existence of two such direction finding stations, though two are not absolutely necessary, makes navigation even safer, for a ship may communicate with both and check up on its bearings. Usually, the two stations agree and the master of the ship then knows that he is safe. Tatoosh station, on the American side, works in conjunction with Pachena station in giving directions to ships entering the Straits of Juan de Fuca from the Pacific Ocean.

Alternative to the direction finding station manned with a staff of operators is what is known as the automatic beacon direction finder. To communicate with and get bearings from such a station, the ship also has to carry direction finding gear. Very few, if any, coast ships carry this and not many ocean-going vessels are equipped with it.
