George Bell of the Canadian National Telegraphic department, recently stationed at Prince George, is recovering in the Prince Rupert General Hospital from an attack of pleurisy.

H. E. Zimmerman, who operates a pole camp at Port Clements, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands and will sail tomorrow evening on the Prince Rupert for a trip to Vancouver.

So far, Ald. Theo Collart has stated that he does not intend to seek aldermanic honors again at the civic elections next month. However, many of his friends are endeavoring to have him enter the campaign again and are hopeful that they will be able to induce him to do so.

With a fair sized passenger list, C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. William Thomas, arrived in port at 1:30 this morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. Quite a number of the passengers were Islanders bound south for the Christmas and New Year vacation. The vessel will remain here until 10 p.m. Saturday when she will sail on her return south over the same route.

A letter from H. Halliwell, Terrace town clerk, informed the hospital board last night that two men who were recently treated in the local institution were not residents of Terrace municipality, but of a logging camp in the district and therefore the municipality was not liable for payment of 70c per diem charges. The matter was left to the secretary for further action, it being pointed out that one of the men in question was really a resident of Terrace.

Ald. W. M. Brown, chairman of the finance committee, reported at last night's meeting of the hospital board that an order had been given to G. M. Hunt for new mattresses for the institution, his tender of \$161.25 having been the lowest submitted. On recommendation of the finance committee, it was decided to have a complete inspection of the water pipes in the institution and replacements made where found necessary. During the recent cold spell there was a good deal of trouble with the pipes in which the pressure had not been up to the mark.

Mention of the valuable service rendered the institution for many years by the late Robert Brydnes, orderly of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, who died recently, was made at last night's board meeting by Ald. W. M. Brown, chairman of the house committee, and Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, who stated that his loss was keenly felt. On recommendation of the finance committee, a bonus of \$10 was ordered paid to P. Worrobec, janitor and night orderly, who was called upon to do extra work following Brydnes' death.


