Great Coal Miners' Strike is Continuing in England with Little Abatement in Sight

Men Return to Save Mines from Destruction But Yorkshire Remains Out; Military Intervention is much Discussed and Publication of Secret Circular makes Sensation.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 24.—The fourth day of the great coal miners' trike brought no sign of a settlement. Almost 25,000 men have aid down their tools, . There are 10,000 out at Nottingham and Derby, while 10,000 in Monmouth and 7,500 of Lancashire workers went back to save the mines from destruction.

Premier Lloyd George and several members of the cabinet conferred with the miners yesterday and the premier will probably meet the officers of the Miners' Federation today.

The triple alliance of labor, composed of railwaymen, transportation workers and miners, met in London behind closed doors and registered a vote of 217 to 11 against conscription participation campaigns and the intervention of the military force in Trades Union disputes.
