German Air Liner Crashes Into Hillside in England When Going To Berlin, Germany, From Croydon

MARDEN PARK, Surrey, England, Nov. 6.—Six persons were killed and two injured when a big German air liner owned and operated by the German Lufthansa Company en route from Croydon to Berlin crashed into a hillside in the fog here today. The dead included three of the passengers, G. P. Milne and G. S. Gaspar, Calcutta; D. L. Jones, Stockwell; and three of the crew, Pilot Rod Schinka, Mechanic Ulrich and Wireless Operator Niklas.

The injured are Prince Eugene Schawmberg, Lippe, acting as second pilot, who was severely burned; and Commander Glen Kingston, a widely known racing motorist and submarine expert, who was slightly injured.


