ager Lokken of That Organization Regard to Duty

The Board of Trade, which has been active in regard to trying to secure the removal of the duty on Canadian halibut entering the United States, heard a letter read by the secretary last night from H. E. Lokken, manager of that organization, in reply to one sent from here. It said:

Your letter of April 1st has been received and the subject matter therein will be given consideration at our next trustees' meeting. This may require some time, as all our trustees are active vessel owners, and a meeting can only be held whenever a sufficient number are in port at the same

"We suggest that you bear in Japanese, halibut in asking for the removal of the halibut tariff on fish entering United States from Canada. If the duty is removed without taking into consideration the origin of the fish, many of the vessels in both the Canadian and American fleets will be forced out of business.
