At the outset of his address Professor Dixon stressed the fact that the ultimate aim of medicine was the prevention and cure of disease. "This practical aspect so far dominates all other," he said, "that medicine is often referred to as the healing art; indeed it is difficult to think of medicine apart from treatment." Continuing, the speaker explained the nature of disease as any unusual functioning of the tissues which might be the result of accident, hereditary weakness or the presence of pernicious

### germ-life. Organized Common Sense

"The science of medicine," he said, "is nothing more than trained and organized common sense based on physiology. It is still usual to speak of it as an inexact science; obviously wrong since medicine uses the same methods as every other science and the results of observation are as definite as those of the chemist or physicist, although it is true that in the complexity of the problem with which the physician has to deal all the conditions of importance may not be known and the results of an investigation though correct for the conditions under which it is taken may be misleading."

The speaker directed the attention of his audience to the progress made latterly in the treatment of disease. During the nineteenth century he said medicine was exclusively occupied with diagnosis so that the medical literature of the period deals almost entirely with the symptons, activities and results of the ever. 


