# Russia Has Begun Open Hostilities China Declares In Publish d Manifesto

MUKDEN, Manchuria, July 24.—The Northeastern Provincial Government of China yesterday issued a long declaration in which it was declared that the Soviet of Russia had actualy begun hostilities by the seizure of the Chinese cargo boats and freight trains and by sending airplanes over Chinese territory.

The manifesto declared: "Aparently this (action by Russia) will lead to a break of the Kellogg Anti-War Pact."

PEKING, July 24. — Concentration of troops is going on both sides of the boundary between Russia and Manchuria. While the Chinese soldiers are well disciplined, the army is inferior in equipment to the Russians.
