

Snowfall Along Southeast Coast of England Heavier Than in Years

LONDON, Feb. 15 .- Europe continued today in the grip of an unprecedented cold wave. In England the temperatures ranged from eight below zero to a few degrees above. The weather is described as the worst since 1895.

Britons, unaccustomed to such weather, have suffered greatly. There was an eight-inch snowfall at Dover and the fall along the whole channel coast was the heaviest in years.

In London last night the thermometer went to two degrees below zero. There was a gray fog in London today which penetrated every house.

Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador, announced today that Great Britain would soon initiate efforts to bring about further limitation of between the principal naval powers of the world.
