

ARE REVISING CUSTOMS RATE

OTTAWA, May 17.—Canada is attempting to revise her entire schedule of fish classifications in the customs tariff schedule, announced W. H. Moore, chairman of the advisory board, at a session yesterday. The hearing was adjourned until a date to be set in the autumn.
