Visitors Welcomed by the City

Over Fifty Prominent Visitors Arrive this Morning and are Shown Industries of the Port

Mayor and President and Members of the Board of Trade at the Dock to Extend Greetings; On the Harbor This Afternoon and Banquet tonight.

Fifty-two members of the Vancouver and Victoria Boards of Trade arrived this morning on the G. T. P. boat Prince Rupert and were welcomed by a representative group of local men including Mayor McClymont, President McCaffery of the Board of Trade and a large number of citizens. There was the usual brand of weather, fine but slightly cloudy, and the harbor looked perfect.

After the boat tied up the local men went aboard and were introduced to the visitors on the quarter deck of the steamer, after which all were driven around the city in automobiles.

As the visitors looked over the drydock and shipbuilding plant, the big cold storage plant and the modern mill at Seal Cove and noted the general air of progress and prosperity there were many expressions of appreciation heard and prophecies as to the future of the city.

Interested in Industries.

Four newspapermen were in the party. Roy Brown of the Province, John Nelson and T. J. McClay of the World and M. G. Baber of the Vancouver Sun. They took careful note of everything and were much interested in the local industries and especially in the fishing business of which they had heard so much. Mr. Nelson is the managing director of the Vancouver World and a brother of O. H. Nelson of this city, former editor of the Journal. He found many changes in the city since his last visit.

Chris. Spencer is president of the Vancouver Board and all the visitors are prominent in their particular business and among the leading citizens of British Columbia's largest city.

After visiting the points of interest around the city the party returned to the boat where they lunched and this afternoon they are being taken around the harbor to Metlakatla and other points of interest on the Thomas Crosby.

NEW WHARF AT STEWART

Tenders Being Called by the Dominion Government for New Structure at the Mining Town.

The Dominion Government is calling for tenders for a new wharf at Stewart. The old wharf is falling to pieces and there is a notice on it warning people that it is dangerous.

The new structure will not be anything like as long as the old one. The latter was built out from the flats and necessarily had to extend a long distance to deep water. The Provincial Government is building a road along the foot of the mountain toward Salmon River which makes it possible for the Dominion to make a big saving on their wharf and it will also be of a more permanent character than the old one. Bids have to be in by August 30 and it is understood that work will be pushed forward at once after that date.

STRIKE SETTLEMENTS IN BRITAIN AND THE STATES

NO CLOSED SHOP FOR SAILORS—COAL EXPORT IN ENGLAND CONTINUES FOLLOWING RETURN OF MINERS TO WORK

New York, July 26.—Terms for the settlement of the seamen's strike which has tied up shipping from Portland, Maine, to Galveston have been agreed upon by representatives of the United States Shipping Board, the International Seamen's Union and the American Steamship Association.

The demand for the closed shop was waived by the union leaders. The demand for the three day watch system at sea was submitted to a sub-committee for further discussion.

London, July 26.—The order forbidding the export of coal from South Wales ports has been withdrawn following the settlement of the big coal miners' strike.

RECIPROCITY ABOUT TO BE REPEALED BY U.S. CONGRESS—REPUBLICANS IN CONTROL

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, July 26.—A Washington despatch to the New York World says: "The immediate repeal of the Canadian Reciprocity Act has been decided upon by the Ways and Means Committee today.

"The first tariff revision has been definitely agreed to by the Republicans since regaining control of Congress and is a step to warn the people against throwing off the high protective wall about American products.

"If possible the repeal of the measure will be rushed through before the summer session."

The Reciprocity Act was passed by the United States Congress in the year 1911. That was the time that Canada refused to do so and turned out the Liberal Government on that issue.

HAYSPORT NO. 1 ASHORE WITH HOLE IN SIDE

is Now High and Dry on Rose Spit and Crew Safe.

The Deep C. Fisheries schooner Haysport No. 1 is ashore high and dry on Rose Spit. The crew are safe on shore over there and the fish were taken off by Capt. Gillen of the Mollie G. who is expected in from the cannery this afternoon and will be able to give all the details and the possibilities of getting the boat off.

A big hole is stove in the side of the vessel where she hit and is now full of water and sand, having been lifted high up the beach and right over the bar by the tide. Passengers on the Prince John yesterday reported that the waves were breaking over her.

The company is holding out hopes that the boat can be floated off and the Haysport No. 1 is being manned to put out with supplies this afternoon. Twenty oil drums are being taken out to aid in the flotation of the vessel.

FOREST FIRES DESTROY MUCH GOOD TIMBER

Rain Checks Ravages in British Columbia But Considerable Damage to South of Line.

Spokane, July 26.—Desolatory strikes of fire fighters, especially in the Kaniksu forest is likely to occur as a result of the walk out ordered by the Industrial Workers of the World.

Loss of Life.
 Olympia, July 26.—The extensive forest fires extend from Cedar Creek in Grays Harbor country to Mima Prairie, Thurston County. At least one logging camp has been burned and heavy loss of life was expected.

The fire east of Tolville is threatening the best stand of white pine in Stevens County.

Everett, July 26.—Telephone reports tell of the burning of Machies 120 miles northwest of here. Whether the town is completely destroyed could not be ascertained.

PRIVY COUNCIL HAS RESERVED DECISION IN THE SOPHIA CASE

Attorney-General Farris Returns Home Immediately Following Conclusion of Hearing.

London, July 26.—Attorney-General Farris of British Columbia is returning to Canada immediately. In an appeal of the C. P. R. against the British Columbia Workmen's Compensation Board asking for an injunction restraining the latter from paying compensation to relatives of the crew of the Princess Sophia lost in Alaskan waters, the Privy Council reserved its decision.
