

The city council, on recommendation of the board of works, decided last night to call for tenders for the 1929 .50 program of concrete sidewalk construction, which consists of the south side of Third Avenue west of McBride 2.80 Street to Third Street, Third Avenue from Seventh to .25 Eighth Streets, the north side of Second Avenue from .02 Sixth to Seventh Streets and the east side of Seventh Street .15 from Second to Third Avenue. 
