

Giant Maritimes Mill Near Completion Effort to be Made Soon to Utilize Big Salmon Dock Prince Rupert

Prince William Will Be Operated to Canneries and Other Nearby Points With Freight and Passengers

When the steamer Prince William is refitted and put into service an effort will be made to secure the shipment of canned saimon through this port, using the big salmon dock for assembling the product here and shipping it direct after it has been collected by the smaller vessel.

The Prince William will be particularly suited for the purpose of handling canned salmon. She is being fitted, not only with the regular wireless outfit, but by a wireless telephone with which they can tak to the canneries. A special effort is to be made to go
