

Towns are Flooded as Rain Falls in Rockies

CALGARY, June 3.—Reaching the highest levels in 27 years, the rivers in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains, swollen by heavy rain and melting snow, flooded Calgary and adjacent towns in Southern Alberta yesterday, while in the mountains all roads east and west have been ashed out. Several bridges have been undermined and n some cases washed out. So far one death is reported, that of an unidentified man at Crossfield, who was swept from a rait.

In the Turner Valley oil fields the wells have escaped damage, but the roads have been washed out, delaying the

hauling of supplies. In Calgary the zoological gardens on the Bow River were washed away, numerous animals being drowned and the park utilities destroyed. Fear was expressed that the ushing waters would tear away the large gas main which arried the supply of natural gas from southern Alberta "ields into Calgary. It is expected the peak of the flood will be reached tonight.
