Much Publicity
From Vancouver Visit.

Prince Rupert is getting much publicity from the visit of the Vancouver party here at the week end. Each of the three papers, the Province, the World and the Sun, had a man along and they each wired an account of the visit each day and also mailed a long story. The result will be that Prince Rupert will be much better known from this time on. No such publicity could have been purchased for a few hundred dollars. Besides that there are fifty men who are so pleased with their visit and with what they saw here, that they will be boosters for Central British Columbia from this time on.

Broad Vision is
Most Satisfactory.

The only way to make life worth living is to have a broad vision. Narrowness, sectionalism, never gets one anywhere. The person with a cramped soul that never sees beyond his own back yard, his little town, his district, his province or even his country is in a bad way. He does not live much of a life. He is related to the clam that grovels in the mud on the beach.

We broaden out by meeting people, by reading, by travelling, by rubbing against our fellows, by getting in touch with wild nature, by sharing the joys and sorrows of our fellows. We get other people's view point and find that there is often not so much difference between opposing views, between political parties, between churches, and between bad and good as we thought there was. Right and wrong are usually points of view. There is more evil in being narrowminded than in most sins. Some people think the greatest of all sins is to be intolerant, and there is a good deal of the argument on their side.

Visitors Closed Their
Eyes to Great Deal.

There were fifty visitors here at the week end and they saw a great deal of the city. We showed them our front gardens but many of them certainly saw our back yards. They came to look for the good in us and no one heard them say anything but pleasant things about us, yet at the same time, if they had set out to do so, they could have raked us fore and aft with explosive shells that would have been very unpleasant.

We go to Vancouver and we see certain things there which we do not like and we hear expressions which are not pleasant, but if the journalists who were here with the party set out to tell of things as they found them and see the wrong end of things and hear what displeased them, they could write things for the Vancouver papers that would be anything but pleasing reading to the people here. Happily there is no danger that we shall be exposed. It might do us good if we were, but the exposing process would be very unpleasant.

Not Knocking
Even Ourselves.

It is not for the purpose of knocking that this is said. It is to show the futility of knocking anyone else. The anvil chorus is never pleasant, even to the blacksmith. If we set out to say things about anyone else we must first clean up our own backyards, and even then it is not wise to act the Pharisee.

Prince Rupert has everything to gain and nothing to lose by having friendly relationship with neighboring places, even as any resident of the city stands to gain from being friendly rather than at enmity with neighbors. As someone might retort that it is wise not to preach too much we say no more. The visit of the Vancouver men who were too big to see the bad in us will be in itself a sermon.
