A Bell-Ingling, who is spending a few days in the city on business, will sail by the Princess Norah tomorrow afternoon on his return to Vancouver, his first trip since he left for Seattle in honor of Major L. Bullock-Webster, formerly of this city, and his British Columbia players, who spent last week in the Sound City. One of these affairs was a luncheon by the Sunset Club.

Motorship Bellingham, Capt. Hooper, arrived in port at 7:30 this morning from Ketchikan with a cargo of seven carloads of frozen fish for transshipment east over the Canadian National Railways.

Provincial Constable Lance Poterton of Stewart arrived in the city on the Catala this morning from the north, having in his custody Reggie Rudland, who has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment on a wilful damage charge.

Union freighter Chilliwack, Capt. J. Muir, arrived in port at midnight last night from the south and, after discharging local cargo which includes coal for the dry dock, sailed this afternoon for Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow night to load lumber.
