Peace Outlet Is Satisfactory Says Vancouver Paper

Sees In Premier's Speech Best Solution of Problem

(Vancouver Star)

Nothing could be more satisfactory to British Columbia than Premier King's announcement at the Auditorium Friday evening that the Federal Government was strongly in favor of giving the Peace River country rail connection with the Pacific Coast as soon as possible.

But, as he pointed out, it would be difficult to get Parliament to take action until the surveys being undertaken by the two great railways—in conjunction with the government of British Columbia—were completed, and it was known what the railway companies thought about the matter.

It was probably by way of reply to some local expressions of impatience that the Prime Minister went on to assure his audience that, if the government should deem that there was unnecessary delay on the part of the companies, it would take steps to push things forward.

At the moment, however, there is no reason to suppose that Mr. Beatty and Sir Henry Thornton are "dilly-dallying." They have both on occasion, and recently, undertaken that the Peace River connection should be made as soon as, in view of all the facts, it was warranted.

There is, of course, a possibility that they may be overcautious, and from this point of view the assurance given by Mr. King is very acceptable, always granting that no political exigencies do not impel the administration to hurry on construction at the cost of making an economic blunder.
