They were Norris and Howard Pringle, sons of Mrs. T. E. Pringle of Fifth Ave., W., and are both very well known here, having lived in this city for a considerable time before joining up.

Howard who was formerly in the Civil Service Department in this city, left Canada with the 11th C. M. R. but was transferred to the 7th battalion in France. With this latter unit he did most of his fighting. Shortly before the armistice was signed Howard took out his commission with the flying corps.

Norris, who was more popularly known with the young people of the city, as he went to school here for some time, left early in '17 with a draft of the engineers. While "over there" he was transferred to the 10th field company and remained with this unit throughout the rest of the fighting.

**CROP FAILURE IN WEST OF ENGLAND**

Hay and Roots Very Scarce Owing To Drought—Butter Allowance Ounce and Half a Week.

Mail advices received from the west of England state that the hay crop there is a failure, in many cases there being not enough grass to pay for cutting. Turnips and other root crops are also a failure caused by a long spell of drought extending over two months. Wheat is the only crop that looks well.

Apples and plums have failed following the poorest crop on record last year. Fruit is four to five times the normal price on account of the shortage.

Cheese and butter which are already very scarce will become scarcer. At present the allowance of butter is one and a half ounces per head per week and cheese is seen only occasionally.
