Bramwell Booth was born March 8, 1856, in Halifax, Yorkshire. His father, in those days, had not conceived the idea of the Salvation Army, and was his early days to the influence and fessed that he was in a state of semirebellion in his boyhood towards his father's intense earnestness for the soul's health. His mother he recognized readily as a tender spiritual force, but he was irked by his father's religious dominance of the home.

I am a witness to the truth that God does save, and by some hidden act He works a new creation in the souls of those who give themselves to Him." 
