## BASEBALL FOR SEASON 1929

### Changes Likely to Be Made in Major League Teams Are Forecast

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—A house cleaning, conducted with as much vigor as if the club were a tail-ender, is putting the champion Yankees in readiness for the 1929 campaign.

Four men who couldn't bolster two of the team's weakest spots in 1928 already have gone and others probably will follow. The departees are Joe Dugan and Mike Gazella, third baseman; Rosy Ryan, pitcher, and Pat Collins, a catcher.

This smacks of drastic action for a team that won the American League pennant six times in eight years in addition to sweeping the last two world series. But Miller Huggins, Yankee manager, countenances no bluffing in his game and is stepping out to strengthen the shaky positions.

### The Yankees

The Yanks have not fully recovered from the scare late last season. At least they still have clear recollections of the team's collapse. The pitchers were blamed then but mediocre work at two of three other posts prevented the great baseball machine from quickly overcoming a handicap that all but beat the Hugmen out of the pennant.

So there will be a new man at third base next year, a fresh face or two behind the bat, perhaps a new player in the shortstop-second base combination, and one or two new pitchers.

Unless Koenig is traded for a third baseman he will get a trial at the position at which Dugan, Gazella and Robertson failed last season. Lyn Lary, coming up from Oakland of the Pacific Coast league, and Leo Durocher will try for Koenig's old job at short, and Tony Lazzeri, whose full recovery from a shoulder strain is anticipated, will play second. Lou Gehrig, of course, will do the first basing.

### Ruth's Legs

Meusel, Coombs and Ruth will do their slugging act again, unless Ruth's legs give way. A long list of substitute outfielders now includes Ben Paschal and Liza Lark, the latter recalled from the Yankee farm at St. Paul. Durst, a holdover, may be there, too, to help in the outfield and at first base.

Some of the spare outfield and infield help may go for pitching talent. In fact Huggins tried hard to use his unwanted extras in trades with Cleveland for George Uhle and with the Red Sox for Ed Morris. He failed in both cases. Consequently he is still dangling the spare men before the other clubs in the hope of prying loose a couple of pitchers to work regularly beside Hoyt, Pipgras and Johnson.

Helmach and Zachary, picked up late last season, together with Myles Thomas, all doubtful prospects

pects for 1929, may be used as additional bait for pitching strength that is certain to be needed and to be needed badly unless Herb Pennock's arm can stand hard 1929 duty.

Most assuredly there will be more trading news from the Yankee mart before the training camp splurge in February. And there will be a few S.O.S. flashes if Pennock and Lazzeri find they cannot get rid of the lameness in their throwing arms.

## SPORTSMEN WHO DIED IN 1928

### Several Rather Prominent in American Games Passed Away

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The world of sport lost some of the most conspicuous and colorful figures of its history in 1928 as death took a particularly heavy toll in the ranks of boxing, baseball and auto-racing.

The diamond mourned the passing of the famous Ee-yah Hughie Jennings, as well as Albert J. Reach, one of the game's pioneers. Joe Lannin, Jack Dunn and Urban Shocker. Kid Lavigne, former world's lightweight champion, passed on, while the knights of the racing wheel lost a famous quartet—Frank Lockhart, Dave Lew's, Norman Batten and Earl Devore, all in dramatic fashion.

Lockhart died in his famous Stutz Black Hawk as it catapulted into the ocean after roaring at 200 miles an hour along the sands at Daytona Beach. Lewis committed suicide in a lonely cabin near Los Angeles, while Batten and Devore went down with the victims of the Vestris disaster.

Baseball lost one of its most unusual characters in Jennings, a great shortstop with the famous old Orioles; manager of a three-time winner at Detroit, and later aide to his old-time teammate, John McGraw, with the New York Giants. He was 56 years old when he died at Scranton early in the year, but Reach, a noted player before Jennings was born, died at the age of 87.

Jack Dunn, famous as the discoverer of Babe Ruth and other stars, piloted seven International League pennant winners at Baltimore, during which time he sold to the majors some of the highest priced players in the game. Babe Ruth went to the Boston Red Sox for comparatively little, but Bob Grove was sold by Dunn to the Athletics for \$100,000.

Baseball, during the year, also lost Frank Wilson, the umpire, as well as such old time figures as Claude Rossman, Marr Phillips and Tom Lovett, who pitched one of the first no-hit games in the big leagues.

## RECRUITS FOR BIG LEAGUES

### Boston Braves Assured of Largest Crop of New Talent With Huge Turnover

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—At least 100 ambitious young baseball players will drop in on baseball training camps of the eight National League clubs next spring trying to break into major league boxscores. A score of men who have had trials before under the Big Top will be on hand for another chance and a few stars in the senior loop will be on familiar ground wearing strange uniforms.

The Boston Braves, with a chance to make 19 changes in their personnel, will have the largest crop of new talent. Some critics of the Braves' baseball behaviour last season may be unkind enough to say they need it. In addition to the hard-hitting Hornsby, who moved by the trade route, the Chicago Cubs have combed the highways and hedges of the minors for untried players and recalled a number who have been found wanting at least temporarily in other years. Hornsby of course comes from the Braves. Fred Maguire, Percy Jones, Louis Segrett and Harry Seibold are transferred to Boston. Pittsburgh gave Glen Wright to Brooklyn for Jess Petty and Harry Ricochina. Tommy Thevenow will take Heinie Sands' place at shortstop for the Phillies.

### Cardinals Fewest

The St. Louis Cardinals will attach fewer players to the club than any other major league outfit but unless plans miscarry two of the infielders brought on from Cardinal farms, shortstop Gelbert and second baseman Selph, will find steady jobs awaiting them. Two other new redbirds were recalled. Mancuso, a catcher, comes from Minneapolis and Herman Bell, right handed pitcher, from Rochester. Elliot from Waco and Hallahan from Houston, are other pitchers.

In addition to the four former Cubs and catcher Pat Collins will be privileged to inspect the wares of many up and coming youngsters. R. B. James, a second baseman, bated .328, stole 30 bases and hit 16 home runs for Omaha last season. C. Fitzberger, a first sacker, was recalled from York and E. B. Clark is on his way back from Providence with an impressive batting mark of .373.

Clarence Mueller, with Toledo, gets another chance as does A. J. Moore, from Buffalo. G. V. Leverett, a pitcher, from Indianapolis, and G. A. Perry, pitcher, from Wichita. R. W. Wertz was recalled from Buffalo and C. Touchstone was purchased from Providence.

### Possible Winners

The Phillies have high hopes of Thevenow and some of the promising players developed last year striking a winning combination. H. H. Peal, from Houston, has a good chance to take an outfield post. E.
