CHAMPIONSHIP IN BILLIARDS

NEW YORK, Feb. 27. — With prize money aggregating approximately \$20,000, the world's championship 18.2 ballline billiard tournament now under way is the richest ever contested. Nearly half of this will go to the winner of first place, the award consisting of a year's salary of \$6,000 during which time his title will not be subject to challenge, a cash prize of \$2,000 and 38 per cent of the net gate receipts. Second place will draw down a salary of \$3,000 with \$1,500 in cash and 23 per cent of the net receipts. Third prize will be \$1,150 and 17 per cent of the net receipts; fourth, \$850 and 12 per cent; fifth \$500 and 7 per cent; with last \$250 and 3 per cent. Those contesting are Edouard Horemans of Belgium, champion; Jake Schaefer, Walker Cochran and Erich Hagenbacher, former champions; Felix Grange, champion of France, and Kinrey Matsuyama of Japan, world's junior champion.

Only Eight More Hockey Games in National League this Season Canadiens Look Like Winners

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—With no more than eight games left on the schedule of any team of the National Hockey League, the lineup for playoffs is beginning to become more definite. The Canadiens, leaders of the international group, seem to head the best position. They have played one less game than the New York Americans and by defeating Pittsburgh last night increased their margin. The Canadiens clash with the Americans in the next game.

The New York Rangers, leaders of the American group, are in a more dangerous position with six games to play. By taking a hard game from Ottawa last night they maintained their one-point lead over Boston, but the Bruins have eight more to play.

Boston took one of the roughest battles of the season from Montreal. There were 22 penalties. The defeat came close to putting the Maroons out of the running for third place. They are tied with Toronto, but the Leafs have two more games to play than the Maroons. Detroit clinched third place in the American group.

EMPLOYMENT BETTER THROUGHOUT CANADA

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—The employment in Canada on February first was in better position than on that date any year on record, according to the Dominion bureau of statistics reports. From 6391 firms there is shown a total of 933,943 employees, against 921,404 on January 1. Manufacturing and logging advanced, while there was a shrinkage in the trade, construction, transportation and communication on the prairies and the situation was also better in British Columbia. There was a substantial improvement in mining, but logging, manufacturing and transportation were slacker.

PROVIDE FOR THE TEACHERS

VICTORIA, Feb. 27.—The Minister of Education, Hon. Joshua Hinchcliffe introduced a bill to provide for the superannuation of school teachers. A reserve fund is being established by the teachers and this is expected to reach a total of \$200,000 during the next year or so. This reserve fund will be supplemented to by a contribution of \$25,000 a year for a period of 10 years by the Province.

POWER AGREEMENT TO BE VOTED ON FRIDAY

City Solicitor E. F. Jones Will Be in Charge of Poll With W. H. W. Murray and Ernest Unwin Deputies
City Solicitor E. F. Jones will be returning officer for the poll of ratepayers which will be held on Friday to authorize or reject the execution of the agreement between the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert and the Power Corporation of Canada for the sale of the city hydro-electric plant and 25-year franchise. Hours of voting will be from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and deputy returning officers will be W. H. Wilson Murray and Ernest Unwin. It is anticipated that there will be about 800 votes cast.

FINES IMPOSED UPON FIGHTERS

Spiro Gurvich and William Stuart Punished for Participating in Sunday Morning Frazes
Ringleaders in a melee which occurred in the early hours of Sunday morning in the lane between Second and Third Avenues and Fifth and Sixth Streets and caused considerable disturbance as well as drawing a big crowd of spectators, Spiro Gurvich and William Stuart were found guilty by Magistrate McClymont this morning in city police court on charges of creating a disturbance by fighting on the public highway under the Vagrancy Act and were fined \$10 and \$20 respectively with options of fourteen or thirty days imprisonment. There was quite a crowd in the courtroom to hear the case. Evidence was given in the Gurvich case by Stuart and Sergeant Hannah, accused also taking the stand on his own behalf. Gurvich and Constable Gilker gave evidence in the Stuart case. The sum and substance was that Gurvich and Stuart, having had an argument earlier in the evening, met later in a restaurant and mutually agreed to have it out with a fight in the lane. Both denied that there had been any noise or disturbance created. They had gone right to the business of fighting and had wasted no unnecessary words. Stuart said that, when things got hot and before the noise was started, he had damped. Sergeant Hannah testified that Gurvich had admitted fighting to him. Constable Gilker testified that guests in the Prince Rupert Club had been awakened from their beauty sleeps by the uproar and had called the police. Sergeant Hannah, before the fines had been imposed, urged that the magistrate inflict heavy penalties. It was a serious matter that men of pugilistic tendencies should carry their battles into the highways and something would have to be done to stop it. The officer pointed out that it made no difference that there had been no noise. It was unlawful to fight on the streets even silently and His Worship doubted if this fight had been actually quiet. If this thing were allowed to continue, the young men of the city would become a band of hooligans and peaceful people would be unable to enjoy quiet. Regarding boxing, the magistrate said it was an excellent thing in its place, but could not be carried too far.
