First Anniversary
Of New Management.

It is just one year ago today that The Daily News came under its present management. At that time we had certain ideals in newspaper making, some of which have been lived up to, but many have had to go by the board. It is for the citizens of Prince Rupert to say whether or not we have made good.

Financially it has been a hard struggle to keep up the standard of the paper and make it pay its way. In that respect we have succeeded, but not to an extent sufficient to make us conceited. Every dollar of profit, when there is any, goes back into the paper in improvements. Beyond that we are not justified in going.

We are planning for greater improvements during the coming year, but all will depend on the support we get from the people of the city. We are well satisfied with the way in which the merchants and citizens have helped along the work. We trust the benefit has been mutual. During the year the circulation of the paper increased fifty per cent without artificial aid of any kind. We have depended wholly upon the goods we had to sell in order to make a market.

We are always glad to receive suggestions in regard to improvements that might be made, but nearly all improvements cost money and the amount that can be spent depends wholly on the income derived from advertising and subscriptions, mostly from the advertising. Publicity is the chief commodity we have to sell.

Armenians Are
Always in Trouble.

According to newspaper despatches the Armenian question seems likely to be solved by the extinction of the Armenians by the Turks. During the war the most horrible tales were told of butchery and other crimes against these people. Somewhat similar tales have been told from time to time for twenty or thirty years. The Armenians have been a persecuted people and the Turks have been the unholy persecutors. The Armenians are Christian and the Turks are Mohammedans.

Some people, who have been through that country and lived there long enough to understand the question, claim that there is little to choose between the Armenians and the Turks, but if anything the Armenians are the worse. These same people claim that the Armenian deserves everything that has been done to him and that whenever he gets a chance he does the same to the Turk. They intimate that we are wasting our sympathies on a people that are no more Christian in the true sense of the word than are the Turks themselves. The difficulty just now is that the Turks are our enemies, while the Armenians are our friends.

Race Question

In the States.

Moses told the people of Israel that they would be punished for their sins unto the third and fourth generation. In the United States Negro slaves were introduced many years ago, more than four generations, yet the punishment for that evil deed continues and will go on for many years to come.

There is a total lack of sympathy between the races and the wonder is that there has not been more trouble. New York had serious riots and now Chicago is in the throes. It is difficult to say where it will break out next. It is only when there are killings that the news is telegraphed out to the world. Strenuous measures are being taken to quell the disturbances, but there will be a bad feeling left for years to come.

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Dora Stephens of Prince Rupert, B.C., as owner in fee under four Tax Sale Deeds from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 9th day of December, 1918, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot one six (16), Block twelve (12), Section Two (2), Lots three and four (3 and 4), Block fifteen (15), Section Five (5), Lot ten (10), Block forty-nine (49), Section Seven (7), and Lot Sixteen (16), Block Twenty-nine (29), Section eight (8) (Map #22).

You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice which may be effected by publication in daily newspaper, and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:

"...and in default of a caveat or certificate of his pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of an unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be for ever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."
