Russia Invades Manchuria and Notice is Sent From Nanking to Signatories to the Peace Pact

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Renewed alarming aspects of the Chinese-Soviet is reported in Reuter's despatch from Mukden, Manchuria, today, which stated that Chang Hseuh Liang, head of the Manchurian government, had ordered 60,000 Fengtin troops to the Siberian border.

It is said that 300 marines who have occupied two small towns on the lower Sungari River have been driven off, six Russians being killed.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Reuter's Nanking correspondent states that the Nationalist government has instructed the Chinese minister at Washington to notify the Kellogg pact signatories that Russia has begun an offensive along the Manchurian border. At the same time they instructed the minister to state that China, while resisting invasion, would abide by the spirit of the pact.

The Chinese action followed after Nanking had received reports confirming previous despatches that Russians had invaded Chinese territory.

DROPPED DEAD AT MIDNIGHT

Charles Sweeney Had Been Resident Here for Some Years and Was Well Known and Esteemed

Charles Sweeney, who had lived in this district for a number of years and was quite well known and esteemed, dropped dead about midnight last night in the Port Clements Cafe, evidently the victim of a sudden heart attack, for he had apparently been in the best of health and spirits right up to the time of his demise.

Sixty-two years of age and a native of Renfrew, Ont., the late Mr. Sweeney had been in this district about ten years and was for some time identified with the bridges and building department of the Canadian National Railway. He had also worked at Stewart and Ocean Falls and for a while recently had been on the staff of the Old Empress Hotel. Before coming to this district he had been in the Yukon Territory. The deceased was single, but is survived by relatives in the east. About a year ago he had received an inheritance. He was a member of the Loyal Orange Lodge. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

PINK SALMON AT ISLANDS

First Chums of Season Put Up at Massett When 400 Cases Packed

SKIDEGATE, Aug. 16.—Pink salmon are running in the Tliell River and chums are showing up at the Dena River and Inskip Channel.

Captain C. B. Haan is outfitting his large seine boat Beatrice H. for the fall fishing.

MASSETT, Aug. 16.—The cannery here put up its first catch of chums a few days ago, about 400 cases being put through.

ALASKA SALMON PACK IMPROVED

CORDOVA, Aug. 16.—A gain of nearly a quarter of a million cases over last year and the largest production since 1925 is shown in the final report on the Alaska salmon pack which totalled 845,000 cases.

JUNEAU, Aug. 16.—South-eastern Alaska salmon canneries had a pack of a million and a half cases of all varieties on August 1. Red salmon accounted for 150,000 cases, an unusual proportion.

STOCKS SHOOT UPWARD TODAY AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Easier money market conditions caused the stock market to boil over today, scores of issues advancing from two to ten dollars a share, many of which scored new high marks. Trading on a tremendous scale took place, blocks of from five to twenty thousand shares changing hands.

ELECTROCUTED AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Aug. 16.—Edwin Bell, a welder, was electrocuted last evening when working on a boat. He was using an electric drill attached to a power wire when he fell into the water holding on to the drill. The water "grounded" the current, sending the full force through the man's body.

GRAF ZEPPELIN CROSSING SIBERIA EN ROUTE TOKIO

MOSCOW, Aug. 16.—The Graf Zeppelin, on its round the world flight from Lakehurst, New Jersey, after a two or three-day rest at Friedrichshafen, safely crossed the Ural mountains into Asia and was reported 600 miles east of Moscow this afternoon.

The next stop of the dirigible is at Tokio, after which she returns by way of the Pacific to New York.

WHEAT JUMPS HIGHER PRICE

WINNIPEG, Aug. 16.—Bullish news from Liverpool and heavy American buying by United States interests forced wheat up 7 1-8 cents today.

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—Wheat jumped here today 5 3-8 cents a bushel.

WHEAT AT VANCOUVER VANCOUVER, Aug. 16.—The price of wheat today was \$1.63 at the local exchange.

There were 240 passengers aboard the steamer Princess Louise which was in port this morning bound from Vancouver to Skagway. Only two persons disembarked here—Mr. and Mrs. William McIver.

T. D. PATTULLO VISITS RUPERT

Gives Opinion on Several Political Questions of the Day

FAVORS STEWART LINE

Criticizes Attitude of Hon. R. B. Bennett on Several Important Matters

T. D. Pattullo, M.L.A. arrived today on the Prince George, and will visit Queen Charlotte Islands and other portions of his constituency, as well as other portions of the north, before going south.

Mr. Pattullo expressed the opinion that renewed activity in Northern British Columbia was very gratifying, and was merely a forerunner of many things to come.

Speaking of the Canadian Northeastern Railway, Mr. Pattullo said that the opposition at no time opposed the building of the railway but was unqualifiedly opposed to the granting of a railway charter and Stewart waterfront to party henchmen, who were not railway men, but who simply intervened between the government and legitimate industry. During the time that the Liberal party was in power, a reserve had been maintained on the waterfront at Stewart for the purpose of rendering it available to legitimate undertaking.

To quote Mr. Pattullo: "It is an outrage that a company such as the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company should be compelled to buy out railway and waterfront rights from party henchmen before they can do business.

"The entry of the Consolidated in the northern field is very gratifying, and should mean much particularly to the north, as well as to the whole province.

Raw Log Export

"I notice that Mr. Bennett has been visiting many portions of the province. Mr. Bennett has not said anything, so far as I have seen, as to the export of raw logs from this province. The federal Conservative party and the Provincial Conservative party are at sixes and sevens upon the tariff, as well as upon other matters, such, for example, as the Fraser River Salmon Treaty.

Keeping Boys at Home

"Mr. Bennett is essentially appealing to the prejudices of our people. When he talks of keeping the boys and girls at home instead of going to the United States, it would be well if he would explain how it was that during the time when he was a minister of the crown under the Borden-Meighen administration, 750,000 Canadians went to the United States in the 10 years that the Conservative party were in office following 1911.

"The policy of the Mackenzie King Government in handling the tariff situation sanely and sensibly is preeminently in the interests of Canada. Canada's trade is greater than it ever was before. A hostile tariff war between Canada and the United States would be only less disastrous than a physical war."

The fight was even until the eighth round, but in the ninth Campolo floored Heenev for the count of seven and the referee stopped the bout.

Empire Conference on Trade Relations is Now Proposed by Winston Churchill at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—The suggestion that an Empire conference of businessmen should take place antecedent to any action by the various administrations of Empire countries and that this conference should canvass all the different ways and means of expanding imperial trade was advanced by Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former chancellor of the exchequer, yesterday before the Canadian Club here.

The whole issue of intra-imperial commerce should be dragged out of the arena of party politics and lifted to a higher and more reasonable platform, in Mr. Churchill's opinion. The world of business should survey the problem in the same spirit as a board of directors of the world's largest merger and should advise Empire governments following their investigations.

FINAL PAYMENT TO CREDITORS DOMINION TRUST

VANCOUVER, Aug. 16.—Final payment to the creditors of the Dominion Trust Company, bankrupted in 1914, was paid today, amounting to slightly more than two per cent, bringing the total payment up to twenty per cent. Depositors received only \$80,000 of the \$800,000 invested. In all, only \$500,000 was returned on assets of \$8,500,000.

COTTON MILLS AGAIN OPERATE

Employees Return to Work at Old Rate Pending Arbitration

MANCHESTER, Aug. 16.—Half a million workers will return to their tasks Monday and the wheels in the Lancashire 1500 cotton mills will start turning after a stoppage of three full weeks.

A conference was held yesterday between representatives of the striking operatives and employers which resulted in an agreement being submitted. The employers demand for an all-round reduction of wages of 12.82 per cent will be submitted to arbitration and in the meantime the employees return to work at the old rate pending a decision of the court.

BIG AIR DERBY WOMEN FLYERS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 16.—Detailed plans for the cross country women's air derby from Los Angeles to Cleveland in connection with the national air races beginning August 26, are announced here by the National Exchange Club, sponsor of the event for the feminine fliers. Cash prizes totalling \$8,000 and many trophies have been offered.

The entrants thus far were announced as Marvel Crossan, Lady Mary Heath, Amelia Earhart, Florence Lowe Barnes, Ruth Elder, Louise McPhetridge Thaden and Bobbie Trout.

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BLAIR HONORED BY GOVERNMENT

Premier Mackenzie King Presents Winner of King's Prize With Memento

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—The government and people of Canada yesterday honored Lieut.-Col. R. M. Blair, commanding officer of the 72nd Seaforth Highlanders of Vancouver, winner of the King's prize at Bisley, when Premier Mackenzie King, at a Canadian Club dinner, presented him with a piece of silver plate suitably inscribed.

Skeena River Seems to Be Only Route for the Highway to Interior

Two Possibilities From Galloway Rapids Until Crossing of Skeena River to South Side Is Made

The aerial reconnaissance in connection with the highway between Prince Rupert and Terrace is practically complete and from information available the outlook is not very encouraging for a route north of the Skeena River. It would appear that there is no feasible route from the head of Warke Canal in any direction leading north or northwest, therefore it seems as if the Skeena River, the outlet provided by nature, is the route to which the road builders must look.

NEW BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Three Outstanding Men Will Handle Grain Business of the Dominion

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—The Canadian board of grain commissioners will be:

F. F. Ramsey, manager of the Canadian Wheat Pool of Winnipeg, formerly a banker.

Professor Duncan McGibbon, professor of political economy, at the University of Alberta.

Hon. M. Hamilton, former minister of agriculture for Saskatchewan.

The announcement was made last night by the minister of trade and commerce, Hon. James Malcom. Recently the three men who comprised the board, resigned.

In making the announcement, Mr. Malcom said the new members were selected absolutely on merit without regard to politics and that the board, in his opinion, would be the most outstanding one of its kind in the interests of the producers.
