PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL GIVES ADDRESS

D. H. Hartness Speaks to Rotary Club on Aims and Ideals of Education

"The school should promote the development of a broad social consciousness," declared D. H. Hartness, the new principal of the high school, in addressing the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday. "Improvements in transportation and communication have crowded, as it were, the whole world into a single parish. If we would live, we must live in peace and amity with our neighbors, for without exaggeration, it may be said that man today is able to destroy himself, or at least impoverish life to such a degree that he would not care to preserve it. But, as man is constituted today through training and education, we are forced to concede that he cannot be expected to live in peace with his neighbors. Either he does not want peace, or else he wants those things which are only compatible with war."

"The school must teach its pupils impartially the history and achievements of their own country, and similarly those of other countries. The heroes of war must be eclipsed by those less arresting figures who have made the positive contributions to civilization—the statesmen, the reformers, the prophets, the scientists, the inventors, the physicians. Indeed, a spectacular heroism will meet the perils of war, but a steadfast heroism must meet the perils of peace. An educational program organized in this large spirit cannot fail to lead an increasing fraction of our people to that vision of the world and that feeling of true kinship with mankind which in the past have been vouchsafed only to the prophet."

Mr. Hartness dealt at some length with the growth of modern philosophy and thought, particularly in their relation to government, scientific development and education, urging that the world we must seek is the world in which the creative spirit is alive, in which life is an adventure full of joy and hope. The young should be educated to realize fully what our institutions have cost in human energy, travail and blood. He urged that new problems be approached with the single-minded desire to learn the truth. Tolerance should be cultivated and a receptive mind developed. He spoke of the brilliant example of Einstein and its effect on philosophical trends and dilated at some length on the new civilization which commenced in the nineteenth century and is the heritage of the present.

MANY GOING TO PEACE RIVER

Prince Rupert Delegation Not Yet Quite Complete; Three Hundred to Be Present

The complement of members of the Board of Trade who are expected to make the trip to Edmonton, Calgary and the Peace River with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce is not yet quite complete. It is hoped to send a large representation and the secretary is hoping that several more will offer to go to represent Prince Rupert. There is one lady talking of going and possibly more may yet join the party from here.

The secretary of the board has just received a communication from the secretary of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce which says: "Indications point to at least 300 registered delegates from across the Dominion at our fourth annual convention. There are at present 100 reservations for the western tour from eastern Canada. There will also be a delegation of between 15 and 20 from Great Britain, including members of parliament representing the Labor, Liberal and Unionist party. The Chambers of Commerce at Birmingham, Nottingham, Manchester, London, Aberdeen and Delhi, India, will also be represented."

There will be a special car of delegates from Manitoba, at least two from Saskatchewan and three from Alberta, while the Vancouver delegates are joining the eastern party at Edmonton in a special train. The Canadian Chamber of Commerce delegation will proceed into the Peace River by two special trains and are assured a most hearty welcome by the local Boards of Trade.

The trip to the Peace precedes the convention proper, which commences September 11 at Edmonton. Special entertainment has been provided for the visitors at both Edmonton and Calgary, the sessions concluding at Calgary on the evening of September 13, twelve sessions in all.
