SALMON PACK

Final Figures Given Out in Regard To 1929 Operations in Northern District

WAS SATISFACTORY

Failure of Chums on Queen Charlottes Was Most Disappointing Factor

The total salmon pack in District No. 2 during the past season was 621,442 cases, as compared with 1,307,546 cases in 1928.. In spite of per species and division are as folthe lower pack, however, 1929 operations were in many respects more satisfactory than last year. In the first place, generally speaking, this was expected to be an off cycle year for most varieties, so there was no disappointment on the whole. One disappointment, nevertheless, was the virtual failure of the chum run on the Queen Charlotte Islands. where it was anticipated it would have been better. It was also a poor year for pinks on the Queen Charlotte Islands, although on the Skeena River the pack of this varity was average. The sockeye pack was well up to expectations and the coho pack was almost up to last year. Many spring and steel head salmon went into cold storage this year instead of being packed, thus accounting to some extent for the decrease in these varieties. Following was the 1929 pack per


