News of the Mines

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT
Official Report on Big Missouri; Development Program for United Empire; Northern B. C. Needs Prospectors

An official report is finally forthcoming from the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. in regard to progress and work that has been done on the Big Missouri mine at Stewart to operate which the Beuna Vista Mining Co. was formed by Smelters. The report reveals that, since September, 1927, when Consolidated started to direct operations, very considerable tonnage of ore has been blocked out on the property. Important developments have been confined to the E. Pluribus and Province claims. The E. Pluribus has been developed by two tunnels and one shaft. From the shaft two tunnels are extended on the 60 and 100-foot levels. Further development has been made by 13 diamond drill holes put down during 1928 in depth from 40 to 159 feet, making a total of 918 feet drilled. While the ore is not blocked out to make possible an average estimate of tonnage, sufficient development work has been done to indicate that a considerable tonnage will be mined from this area. The principal values are in silver, lead and zinc with low gold values.

In the Province claim the tunnel has been driven a distance of 2330 feet, the maximum depth obtained being 550 feet. Ore was encountered at 1675 feet westerly from the portal of the tunnel and drifts driven on this ore eastward 160 feet and westward 230 feet. A cross cut was driven from the north drift for 110 feet and another from the south drift for 40 feet west. The principal values found in the drifts and cross-cuts are in gold with some silver, and, in places, lead and zinc. The gold occurs free and is mostly in white quartz, but the values are erratic and range from 40c to as high as \$2000 per ton.

Attempts have been made to arrive at an average value of the gold and silver from hand sampling, but, owing to extreme variations, such attempts are not considered reliable. Only by sampling in quantities of mill run can the true values of the ore be obtained, it is officially stated. Hand sampling and diamond drilling, however, indicate that there will be a large tonnage of profitable ore in the Province claim. During the year a number of shallow pits and open cut work was done on the surface adjacent to the Province shaft. The values found were gold, silver, lead and zinc. This was of low grade but, if operated on a large scale, might prove profitable, the report concludes.

The development program for the current year of the United Empire property at Stewart includes the installation of drilling machinery to be operated by water power and the continuation of the drilling and cross cutting of No. 1 and 2 veins. The ore formation is reported to be somewhat similar to that on the Silverado, Prosperity and Porter-Idaho groups. Officers and directors of the company for 1929 are: President, C. L. H. Branson, Victoria; vice-president, J. B. Dickson, Victoria; managing director, William Dann, Stewart; secretary-treasurer, Joseph F. Morris, Vancouver; directors, F. R. Janowski, W. S. Lane and J. A. Parker.

A compressor and quantity of pipe has been delivered at Stewart for the Mountain Boy mine, development of which will shortly be resumed by the Pat Daly Mining Co. of Montreal.

Things are looking good on the Marmot Engineer mine at Stewart, where 40 feet of tunnel has been driven during the past few weeks. Twenty tons of oil and other supplies were taken up to the property last week by Jack Rennie, Marmot River packer. George H. Bunn, well known pioneer prospector, is managing director.

Dr. Forrest A. Kerr of the geological survey of Canada has written a lengthy and detailed report on the rich mineral district awaiting prospectors in that part of the province north of Stewart. "Perhaps nothing is more amazing," writes Dr. Kerr, "in the history of British Columbia than the fact that, during 50 years of phenomenal progress, practically one-third of the province has remained stagnant. This part of northern British Columbia shows very little evidence of the prosperity that has been enjoyed throughout central and southern B. C. This lack of development cannot be attributed entirely to inaccessibility, since only a small strip of land separates the western border of this area from the Pacific ocean. Neither is it due to lack of potentialities which may be considered to compare favorably with those of other parts of the province. The factor which has militated against development more than anything else seems to have been a general apathy toward

the district with a consequent lack of appreciation of its possibilities." Dr. Kerr describes at detail the history of mining activity throughout the district and refers to all the more important operations of the present as well as the past. "More than anything else," concludes the article, "northern B. C. needs capable prospectors and there is much to warrant fully the belief that honest effort will be met with just reward. Following in the footsteps of the prospectors will come capital, industry and prosperity in which north and south will share alike." Dr. Kerr urges that Canadian capital should go into this promising field. From 75 to 90 per cent of the development of northern British Columbia mining has been so far by American capital and, consequently, much of the money thereby earned has found its way into the United States.






Unusual view from an airplane of winter playground, Miami Beach, Florida, which has more than recovered after the hurricane disaster of a few years ago and is more popular than ever.

Trustees Employers Corporations



Do not incur the penalties which the law imposes for delay.

What is Required of Persons Acting as Trustees

All trustees, executors, administrators, assignees, receivers or persons acting in a fiduciary capacity are required to make a detailed return of the income of the estate or trust which they represent.

This return should be made on Form T3.

What is Required of Employers

Each employer in Canada must make a return giving particulars of salaries, wages, commissions, fees, bonuses and other remuneration of all direc-

tors, officials, agents, employees, professional men or other persons who received \$1,000 or more during the calendar year 1928, and who were paid at a rate of wage or salary (including bonus) equal to \$1,500 or more per annum during the same period.

Employers should ask for Form T4.

What is Required of Corporations

Every corporation in Canada is required to file a return of its dividends or shareholders' bonuses paid or credited during the calendar year 1928.

This return should be made on Form T5.

Get Your Forms at Once!

Blank forms may be obtained by writing your nearest Inspector of Dominion Income Tax, or Postmaster, or the Income Tax Division, Department of National Revenue, Ottawa. The addresses of inspectors are given herewith. Full instructions appear on each form.

Do not delay because of the absence of officials who generally sign such reports. Any responsible member of a firm or corporation, or any person acting as agent for the trustee, may sign these returns and so avoid the penalty.

March 31 is the last day for making information reports required under the Income War Tax Act.

The Income Tax Division respectfully asks for the fullest co-operation of taxpayers required by law to make these returns.
