

ICE THICK GRANBY BAY

Ice has been so thick on Granby Bay at Anyox during the past few days that small boats have not been able to navigate on it according to word brought to the city from the north on the steamer Catala today. The Anyox-Alice Arm ferry boat Awake had to cancel a scheduled trip at the end of last week owing to the ice and small boats of the Granby Co. were unable to move out. The steamer Catala, entering Anyox yesterday morning, had to break her way through a couple of inches of ice. There is no solid ice in Observatory Inlet or Portland Canal as the winds and tides keep these bodies of water clear.

SHIPMENT OF BANANAS FROM WEST INDIES

ST. JOHN, N.B., Feb. 12:—A practical example of Canada's expanding trade with the British West Indies was given when the M.S. Lady Drake of the Canadian National Steamships docked here at midnight with the first direct shipment of bananas, an experimental lot of five hundred bunches for St. Lucia. This is the first shipment of bananas through the port of St. John for generations or since the almost forgotten days when they could be purchased for ten cents a bunch.


When official representatives of the Canadian Government and the National system were visiting St. Lucia, one of the richest islands of the southern colonies, on the Lady Nelson a month ago, the people there said that their success would depend on getting a share of the Canadian market. They have lost no time in putting forth most enterprising efforts. Previous boats have brought to Canada experimental shipments of tomatoes and other vegetables and fruits from that fertile island.

Hitherto for many years the banana importation of Canada, amounting to about two million bunches annually, have been almost entirely brought through American ports and channels. The two ships now completed for the Canada-Jamaica service are specially equipped for handling bananas direct to Canada.

COLLISION JUGO-SLAVIA


