Will Replace Catala Next Sunday: Cardena to Be Laid Up For Annual Overhaul

Arriving here next Sunday afternoon from the south, the steamer Camosun will take over the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Anyox-Stewart and waypoints run of the steamer Catala for several weeks. The Catala is to go on the Vancouver-Bella Coola-Prince Rupert and cannery route in place of the steamer Cardena, which is to be withdrawn for overhaul, and will make her first voyage on this route next week. After overhaul of the Cardena is completed, the Catala will be laid up for overhaul and the Camosun will remain on her run.
